








Tough Rugged Tigers

No matter how you slice it, the Urbana football team had a highly successful year despite its mediocre 5-4 record. They beat Champaign Central 13-6, came within seconds of defeating 4th ranked Belleville Althoff, defeated previously unbeaten Springfield and placed three men on all-conference teams with 4 honorable mentions. The three all-conference selections were co-captain Jeff Smith, Mike Rusk and Mike Daly. Bruce Walker, Pete Jones, Pete Alagna and Willie Southall made honorable mention. Pete Alagna was "Most Valuable", Mike Rusk "Most Improved" and Jeff Smith "Best Offensive Lineman". Kerry Hopkins was winner of the "Defensive Player of the Year" award. The Tigers started the season with 25-0 and 26-0 victories over Rantoul and Decatur Mac Arthur. Urbana lost its next two games 7-0 to Danville on a questionable call and then a 27-25 heartbreaker to Belleville Althoff. Urbana was led to 25-7 by quarterback Kerry Hopkins, only to see their lead dissolved by the superb passing of the opposing quarterback. Coach called Urbana the hardest hitting team he had ever seen against a team which outweighed them twenty pounds per man. Urbana recovered to beat Springfield 39-15, but they lost at homecoming to Bloomington 25-7 in a very uninspired game. However Smitty's men won "The Game" giving them a winning season and enabling Coach Smith to even his record against the cross-town power





It was another successful year for the Urbana Sophomores. They compiled a fine 6-3 record which included a victory over cross-town rival Champaign Central. The Tiger Cubs, coached by Dave Casstevens, had five men eventually moved up to varsity. Sophomore Mike Franke was the varsity place kicker most of the year. Other sophomores lost to the varsity included center Steve Lovett as back-up man to All-Stater Jeff Smith, Reggie Clark, and B. J. Brown, both of whom were used to fill in at safety. Preston Neal was also employed by Coach Smith as he played quite a bit as a middle-linebacker toward the end of the season. He was also star running back for the sophomores. Bob Carrie, picked up his own fumble and ran it through the middle of the line for a game saving touchdown. All in all it was a very successful year, and the young Tigers should be very helpful next year as they move up to varsity.

Young tigers gain experience and finish strong. Coach Oscar Adams' '68-69 Tigers entered the season young and inexperienced, but emerged as an efficient and much improved ball club. Barely able to buy a game early in the season, the Tigers came back to revenge several earlier Big 12 losses, upset Centennial and advance to the Regional finals before bowing to Champaign. Despite their slow start, the Tigers came back to even their record and finish with a respectable 12 wins and 15 losses. The '69 Tigers were generaled by Captain and all-Big 12 guard, Willie Southall. Willie was indispensable as both playmaker and scorer (13.0) and provided the team with much needed stability and experience. He was supported by A. C. Upshaw, Ron Williams and John Huett up front and Mac Bigger in the back court. Amazing (jumper) Upshaw led the team in rebounding and was second in scoring (12.4). Together with Biggers (10.6), Huett (8.2) and Williams (9.1), he should help lead a strong and experienced offensive attack for next year's Tigers. The Tigers started four juniors and have thirteen underclassmen. 










Fast Finish






Engles-Tigers Are Successful

Pete Engels, third place finisher in the state wrestling meet, signified the end of a successful wrestling season. The Tigers managed to scrape out a 6-9 season mark, despite the loss of two outstanding wrestlers of a year ago, Ron Dix and Pete Alagna. Unlike many Urbana teams of the past, the Tigers starred not in the duel meet season, which their 6-9 season record indicates, but in the major tournaments preceding. The conference, first major tournament of the season, found Urbana placing seven men and finishing a strong fourth, just behind Champaign who took third. The Tigers outdid themselves the following week at the district tournament in Rantoul. This time the Tigers placed eight men and finished third, some 20 points ahead of Champaign. Urbana was topped only by Danville and a mighty Rantoul team unbeaten in 17 duel meets. The district meet saw Urbana qualify four wrestlers for the sectional meet at Norman. The champions were Pete Engels, Nick Gibala, Ford Mautz, and second place finisher Carl Lyman. Later on in the week, they were joined by third place finishers Chris Copeland and Steve D'urso, qualifying as a result of injury to a qualifier ahead of them. With six sectional qualifiers the Tigers charged into Normal where they captured 4th in one of the toughest sectionals in the state. Rantoul, the district winner and one of the favorites finished with a mere 4 points. Pete Engels and Nick Gibala, state qualifiers for the second year in a row, carried the Tiger hopes into the Assembly Hall. Although Nick dropped his first match, Pete managed with a fine third place finish, giving Urbana 11 points and a 15th place finish.
