











#### Girls Support Minor Sports







#### **Football** 1964

Possibly the fastest team in Champaign history, our Maroons displayed a tremendous amount of power and speed enroute to a 7-2 season. Led by the expert coaching of Head Coach Tommy Stewart and Assistants Wes Davis and Charlie Sides, the Maroons had the strongest offense in the league. CHS scored 43 touchdowns in nine games and averaged 32 points per game, while holding their opponents to approximately six points.

Highlighting the season was the naming of Bill Huston to the News-Gazette All-State team, and the placing of seven Maroons on the All-Conference teams. Dave Mehnert, Jeff Trigger, and Bill Huston were honored on the first team while Tom Crum, Renard Danenhower, Mike Butler, and Joe Lee were

selected on the second squad.







With expert coaching, and with Bill Huston leading the way, our Maroons were the top offensive team in the league. Huston shattered all CHS rushing records with 33 touchdowns in his career, 1,261 yards in one season, and 2,485 yards in his career. There were many other outstanding individuals on this team, such as Jeff Trigger, Dave Mehnert, Rod Lewis, Ron Shirley, Renard Danenhower, Tom Crum, and Ron Green, who composed probably the fastest line in the history of Champaign football. Mike Butler was an outstanding end, catching nine passes for 274 vards and six touchdowns.

In the offensive backfield, Joe Lee had a great year, accounting for 707 yards and nine touchdowns, and was third in the league in scoring. Other valuable ball carriers were Glenn Wood and R. E. Goines. The quarterbacking job was capably handled by Chuck Spencer. An excellent ball-handler and a good passer, he completed 17 out of 33 passes for 423 yards and eight touchdowns. Rocky Peacock, only a junior, was the fullback, but he actually played the part of another lineman. Rocky was an excellent blocker and really helped in opening holes for the backs.

Along with its powerful offense, CHS also possessed a tough defense, which gave up an average of only one touchdown per game, while the offense was scoring about five. The Maroons' strong forward wall consisted of Tom Crum, Jim Johnson, Bruce McGlasson, Dave Mehnert, Ron Green, and Rich Patton, who made it difficult for anyone to gain any yardage up the middle and always put a hard rush on all opposing passers. Backing up this wall was a trio of superb linebackers. Spots were Joe Lee, Lynn Peabody, and Glenn Wood. These boys, along with defensive halfbacks Mike Butler and Bill Huston, were in charge of pass defense and stopping all wide plays.

And so again, the Maroons finished a highly successful season. This 7-2 season brought Coach Tommy Stewart's career record for his 12 coaching seasons at Champaign to a phenomenal 80-18-6.










Linebacker, Lynn Peabody, leaps to make a key tackle in the 34-7 victory over Springfield Griffin.

Highlighting the sophomores' football season was their last game with Stephen Decatur. In this game






Taylor Davis drives in for an easy layup with Mike Butler poised for a possible rebound.


After Christmas, the Maroons were much im-

Mike Dixon brings the ball down the court in a game against Mattoon. The Maroons went on to win 49-35.


