



Coach Don Pittman, in his second year at the helm of the wrestling team, along with Coach Rich Wooley, produced a wrestling squad which appears to be unbeatable in the Big 12 Conference.

Leading the way for the grapplers had been captain and three-year regular, Garry Melchi. At mid-year, Garry had won all of his matches, many of which were by pins. Boys having lost only one match are Bob Taylor, Steve Green, and Steve Moore. Along with these four boys John Palmissano, Greg Kaiser, Doug Mattox, Dennis Mattox, Gary Redmon, Fred Hampton, Dave Mehnert, and Ron Shirley were outstanding for CHS this season.



These first three dual meets were highlighted by some outstanding individual performances by Kip Pope, Dave Frerichs, Jeff Trigger, Art Wolfingbarger, Craig Kelsey, and Jeff Tock.




CHS tankmen, Gary Tummelson and Jeff Tock dive off the starting blocks during a Big 12 Conference meet.

January 9, Champaign brought home a thirdplace trophy from the 25-team Riverside-Brookfield invitational meet. Gold medal winners were Kip Pope, breaking the meet record in the 100-yard breaststroke, and the medley relay consisting of Tom Bonnell, Kip Pope, Dave Frerichs, and Jeff Trigger, which turned in a record breaking time 1:46.6. Also placing high were Frerichs with a second in the 100-yard butterfly, and the freestyle relay team which placed a strong sixth.

Coach Fredricks attributes the Maroons success to team balance and depth supplied by Jim Keller, Doug Hatfield, Rich Patton, Vernon Eroh, Gary Tummelson, and divers Mike Haley and Chuck Collinson. Coach Fredricks anticipated some outstanding performances in both the Conference and District competition.

Last summer Dr. E. H. Mellon, Superintendent of Schools for the past 22 years, traveled to Seattle to accept the National Education Association's Pacemaker Award in behalf of the Champaign Unit Four School District. The honor, given to a total of eight school systems across the country which were judged as outstanding in some way, was awarded to Champaign on the basis of the all-around excellence of the program.

Mr. George P. Hankinson came to the school system in 1963. As Assistant Superintendent for Business, he is responsible for gathering information for the annual budget, processing all purchase orders, and is in charge of transportation, maintenance, and cafeteria programs. He has the supervision of all 245 non-academic staff members as well as the payroll of all employees. The school budget which Mr. Hankinson administers will exceed nine and one-half million dollars this year.

Robert Cooley, is primarily concerned with the Unit Four educational program. As an extension of this responsibility, he serves as permanent chairman of the Faculty Curriculum Board.

Dr. Cooley left his post as coordinator for curriculum development in the Kenosha, Wisconsin, public schools to come to Champaign in 1963.

The Unit Four Board of Education is comprised of Champaign citizens from varied walks of life. It includes housewives, one farmer, and employees of the University of Illinois, the county probation office, and a brokerage firm.

A chief concern of the Board this year was the referendum for the completion of phase II of the Annex, which will become Champaign's second high school. In the fall, Mr. William Froom, President, and other Board members presented information about the bond referendum to the community. With the passage of the referendum on December 5, work on Phase II got underway.

Science, Math Departments Offer



The ten teachers in the math department represent an increase of three teachers over last year's staff. Several of the teachers are also members of the science and counseling staffs and two others serve in Project Creativity in the study of economics. A new textbook, Modern Algebra, has been added. Eventually the series to which it belongs will replace the present traditional texts. Courses offered range from beginning Algebra and geometry through calculus and U. of I. on-campus math for those who wish to study higher mathematics.

After many years at CHS Mr. William Clark, department head retires this year.







Advanced Courses

Elementary students are being introduced to the principles of physics through talks and demonstrations given by several advanced physics students to fourth and fifth classes. Advanced courses are offered in the three fields of biólogy, chemistry, and physics. A new approach is being used to teach beginning biology, called the Biology Science Curriculum Study, which uses the discovery method to encourage students to gather information and draw conclusions through lab exercises. Although science courses are not required at CHS, enrollment in them keeps pace with school expansion, as is indicated by the 17 classes offered in chemistry, nine in biology, and five in physics.

Supplement to CHS Language Lab

Language labs and class recitation are becoming the focal point as foreign language classes study through the oral-aural method. In this program emphasis is placed on conversation and comprehension of the spoken word. One exception is the experimental program at the Annex in first- and second-year Spanish using a visual-audio program. Modern language classes make use of the recording facilities for aid in easier correction of their pronunciation difficulties.

The new language laboratory at the Annex is the newest and best-equipped in the school system. Each student booth has a tape recorder plus regular equipment for more efficiency in lab work. When the lab is completely finished, taped programs can be sent from a center on first floor to the second floor lab, regular classrooms, and small study carrels between classrooms.



To give students a choice of business-oriented clubs, the Business Education department sponsors Office Occupations, Distributive Education, Commercial Club, and Future Secretaries. The Business department offers not only the largest number of clubs of any department, but also the largest number of courses. These 17 courses include notehand, merchandising, advanced bookkeeping, and data processing, all of which have been initiated in the last two or three years. 

P. E. Adds Ping Pong, Parallel Bars


