

GAA members also participated in a Halloween party followed by a trip to the Campus Life spook house.





However, cooking skills were the




The initiation banquet was held in


the spring. Gold tassels and shoulder cords were worn by senior members at the graduation ceremony.









Without this club, students at Central would never get to see how students from other countries live.






