

Coach Warren Smith's 1964 Tiger Football Team was possibly our first team in seventeen years with no major weaknesses. Incorporated into the fighting unit were a defense which allowed opponents only six touchdowns, an offense which was extremely versatile with good depth, and an exceptional attitude towards personal improvement and the unity of the team. With these assets, the Tigers earned, against very tough teams, a perfect winning record, nine out of nine games, to become the Big 12 Champs.

Six tremendous players provided good running ability, excellent blocking, and consistent passing ability to secure Urbana's triumphs. Ralph Waldron, quarterback, who led the diversified attack, earned his place as an All-State Football Player by his passing, running, and fantastic blocking plays.






The Urbana Tigers— a Superb Team

Quickness and pursuit were the qualities of the Tiger defense, which successfully held opponents to 564 yards rushing and 447 yards passing. Kim Kimberlin, who was voted an All-State linebacker, proved to be a threat to ball carriers. Ralph Waldron, Joe Hewkin, L. C. Owens, Mike Casey, Rex Renfrew, Dike Bialeschki, Brian Ford, and Charlie Briether made hard, sure tackles to seal escape routes, and Mike Sheets, Tom Tresslar, and Paul Jacob stopped ball-carriers repeatedly. As an example as to what the defense could do, against a potent offense at Lincoln, they allowed only 34 yards in Lincoln's 34 plays.

Good leadership from Captains, and Seniors plus interest in football kept the morale of the team at a high peak as shown by their victories over undefeated Centralia, Springfield, Bloomington, and the once defeated Champaign team. In practice, the team ironed out mistakes that were made in the first two games, and then met the challenge of the rugged Big 12 competition to become the third undefeated Urbana team in school history.

Tiger teamwork is our most important asset.









Out of eleven dual meets, the Tiger harriers brought eight victories to U.H.S., and they placed second in the district cross-country meet and seventeenth in the state. In the conference meet, Mark Schmidt led the pack winning first with a record time of 9:23:1. Other outstanding seniors were Kirk Cureton, Dave Hodgman, and Marty Slade. Sophomore Alan Taylor was the first man among the sophomores and juniors with George Faber, Dave Parkinson, Lewis Childress, and Stan Dilley following closely. The 1965 crosscountry team worked out in the summer heat and the chill of early winter to uphold Urbana's tradition of fine teams.




























Seniors who were outstanding for their three years in high school were Mark Schmidt, Kirk Cureton, and Ralph Waldron-middle distance, Mike Sheets-shot and discus, and John Colson and Bill Brown-sprints. Track captain, Charlie Bareither took control of the 440 in early practices, and Clarence Winfrey and Bill Lillard worked on the other sprints. In the hurdles were Robert Hamm, Mike Casey, and Bill Brown. In the field events, some competitors were Evan Holmes, and Dan Franklin-pole vault, Bob Smith, and Gerald Wood-high jump and broad jump, and Rex Renfrew and Tom Tresslar adding to the discus and shot put. 






