Defining our Tigers

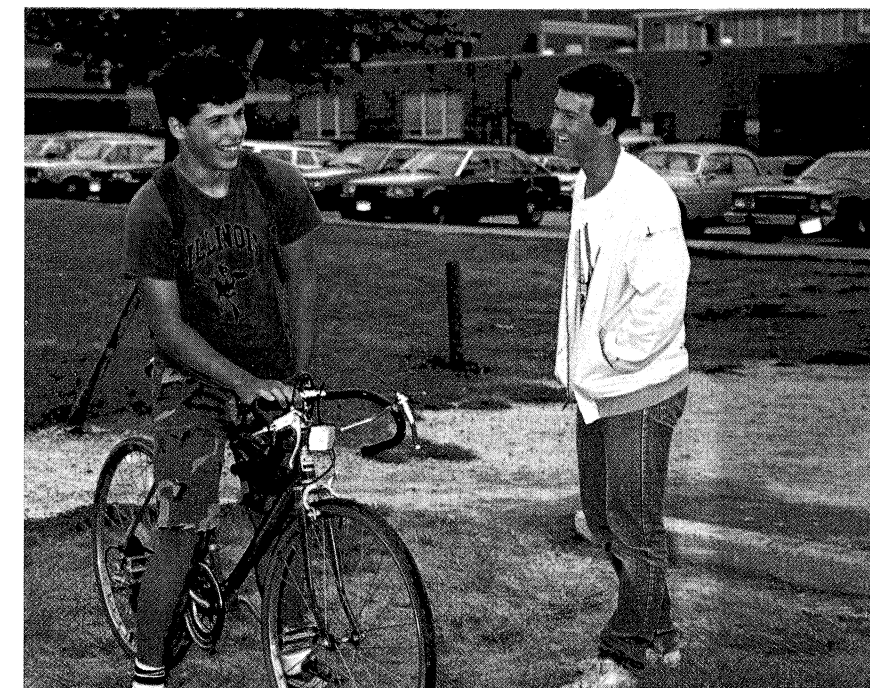
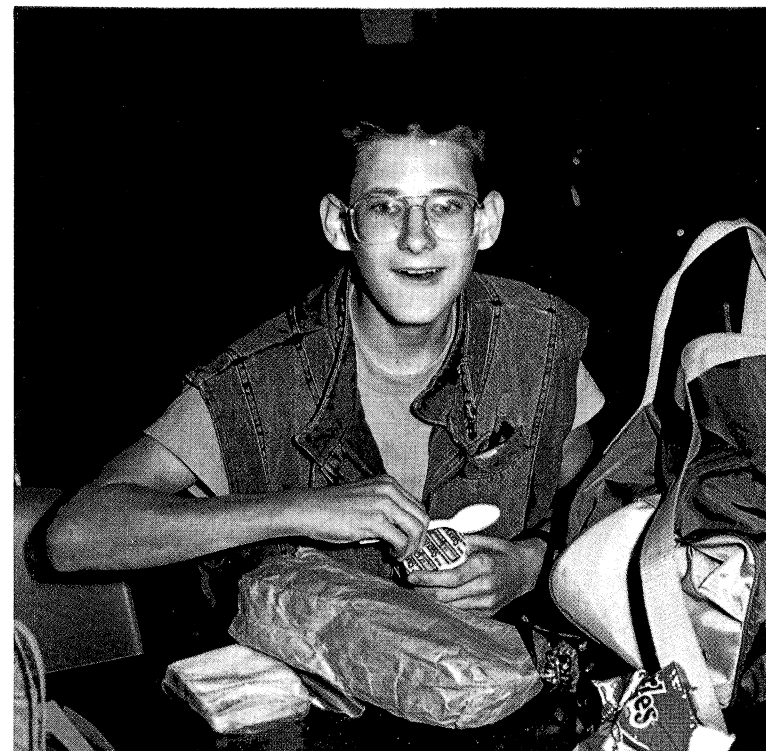
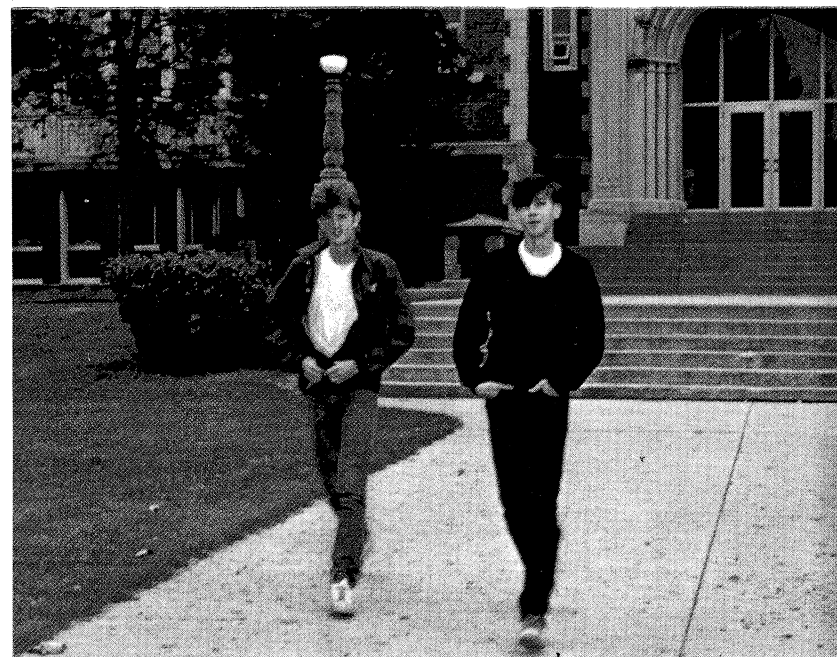
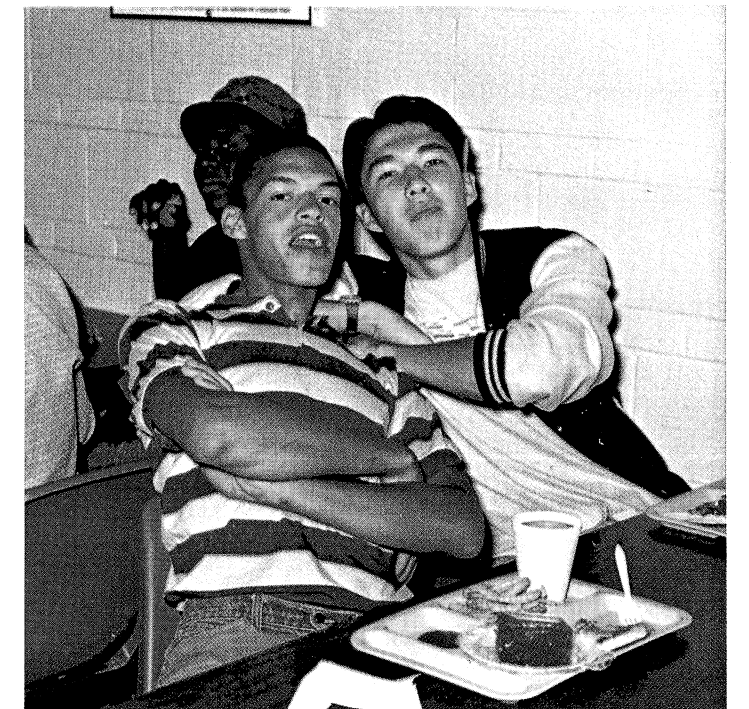
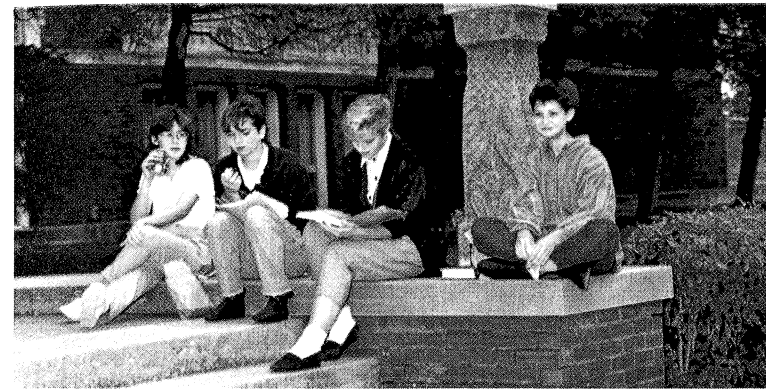
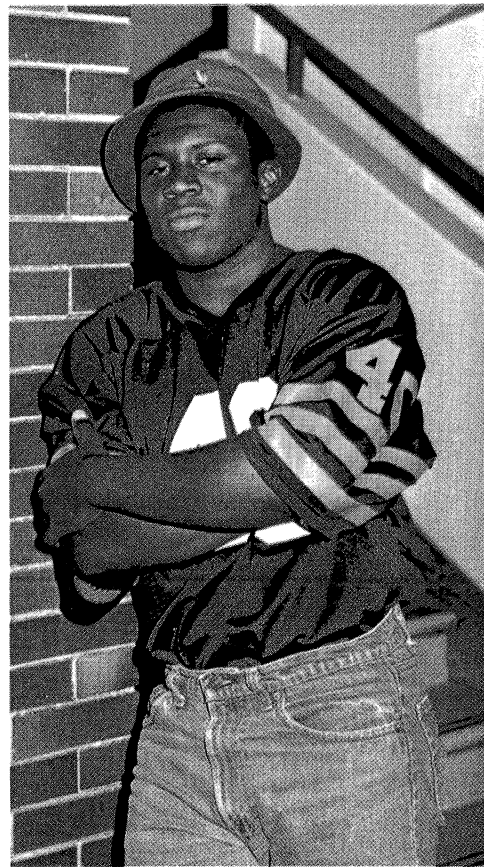
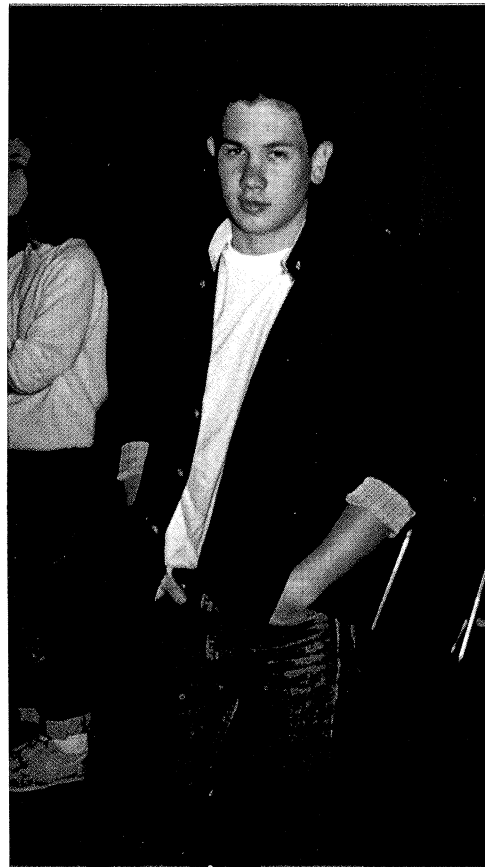

BEYOND URBANA HIGH — 1986-87

The 1986-87 year has given us much to remember and much to learn. Martin Luther King Day was officially celebrated for the first time as a federal holiday on January 20. Just eight days later, America faced tragedy as the space shuttle Challenger blew apart just 73 seconds after liftoff at Cape Kennedy. The worst space accident in history claimed the life of teacher Christa McAuliffe and six NASA astronauts and left the nation mourning. A presidential commission traced the accident cause to a faulty design of the shuttle's solid rocket booster joints. Future NASA shuttle missions were grounded until at least February, 1988.

In the week of February 10, Jean-Calude Duvalier (Baby Doc) boarded a U.S. Air Force plane and headed for exile in France; thus ending his family's 20 year rule of tyranny. Not long after, Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos and his family escaped civil turmoil, landing in U.S. helicopters in Hawaii. Corazon Aquino, widow of Marcos antagonist Benigno Aquino, Jr., assumed the Philippine presidency.

On April 15, U.S. fighter jets dropped some 60 tons of bombs over five targets in Libya following a Libyan attributed bombing of a West Berlin disco which American GI's frequented. All but one of the 150 attack planes returned from the mission which had been made more complex by France who refused to let the jets fly over French air space. The message went out to terrorists world wide that acts of terrorism brought reprisal.

In Illinois, two disciples of political extremist Lyndon LaRouche won shocking upsets in the March Democratic primary. Mark Fairchild won the nomination for Lieutenant Governor and briefly became Adali Stevenson's running mate, while Janice Hart won the nomination for Secretary of State. Stevenson refused to run on the same ticket with the two whom he labeled "neo-Nazis". He renounced his Democratic party and formed the Illinois Solidarity Party. Nazism clouded the campaign of Kurt Waldheim for the presidency of Austria when allegations of his anti-Jewish activities in Salonika, Greece during WW II became public. The four decade secret was denied and Waldheim became the Austrian president.

On the lighter side, celebrated comedians Robin Williams, Whoopi Goldberg and Billy Crystal organized "Comic Relief," a benefit cable special, to raise money to house America's homeless. The March 29 benefit received rave reviews. The homeless dilemma continues in the winter of '87.

In the week of April 7, a bomb exploded aboard TWA Flight 840 from Rome to Athens. The bomb ripped a hole in the body of the plane, and several of the victims were blown from the plane as it flew over Greece. In the U.S., actor Clint Eastwood of "Dirty Harry" fame became the mayor of Carmel, California. Across the world, Chernobyl No. 4, a Russian reactor 80 miles north of Kiev, caught fire and blew up, spreading radiation over the earth. The Soviets denied the blast until confronted by data from Scandinavian monitoring devices. In the week of June 27th, South African leader P.W. Botha imposed a nationwide state of emergency which barred the press from covering protests by blacks against the government's apartheid policies. In the U.S., movements to divest in South Africa because of these policies grew stronger.

On July 4, America threw a birthday bash in celebration of the 200th anniversary of the Statue of Liberty. Millions of dollars and months of work on restoration revitalized America's symbol of freedom. Artist Andrew Wyeth's secret cachet of 240 works of model Helga jolted art to the forefront of the news.

At the other end of the scale, the drug crisis swept through the nation. Despite all the arrests and drug seizures, drug traffic continued. Bringing pressures on users became the new front of attack and drug testing on federal employees began.

In the week of August 18, Congress revamped the tax system in what President Reagan called a "sweeping victory for fairness." In that same week, the Senate voted \$100 million in aid to anticommunist Nicaraguan Contra rebels. This Central American war continues. In September, another terrorist attack cut down people aboard a Boeing 747 in Pakistan. Shortly after, a ten day siege of terrorist bombings followed in Paris.

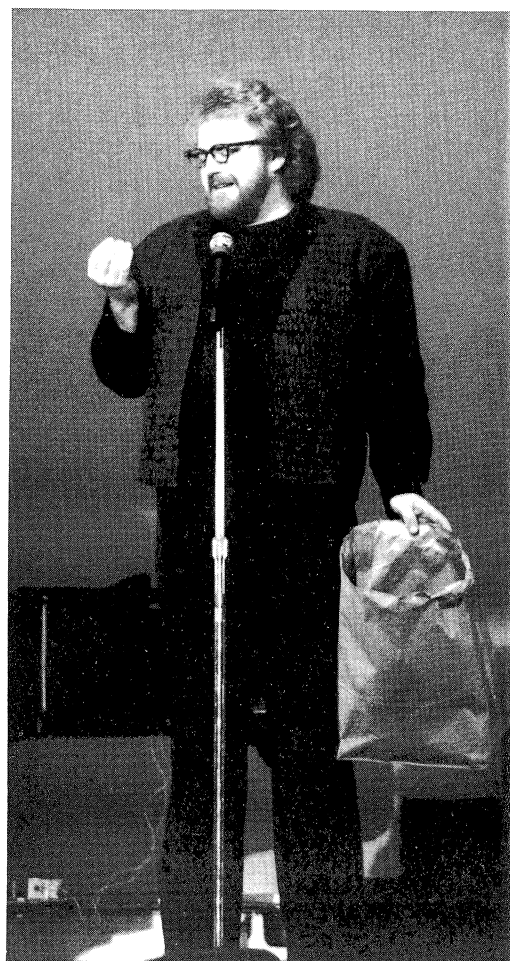
President Reagan and Soviet Mikhail Gorbachev met on October 12 for a two-day preparatory summit and nearly achieved an historic breakthrough on arms control, but the summit broke down as Reagan rejected an all-or-nothing Soviet proposal. In November, the tangled affair of arms to Iran for hostages and money funneled through Swiss accounts to Nicaraguan Contras broke and still dominates the news. The world beyond makes Urbana High a small but secure place in contrast.

Stripe of Fame Comes Home

Urbana alum and Broadway star Kevin Marcum returned to perform "Kevin Marcum and Friends" as a benefit for the high school which provided his first platforms for talent. Fresh from a run as Old Deuteronomy in the Tony Award winning CATS, the 1973 grad showed boldly that tigers have unique stripes. His career which began under the direction of Coach Barbara Griffiths has followed his working in the soap opera "One Life to Live," guesting as an artist in "An Evening with Learner and Loewe" with the Baltimore Symphony, and touring in the Richard Burton production of CAMELOT. After his October 25 and 26 performances here, Marcum returned to New York to begin rehearsal as understudy to the lead in the upcoming LES MISERABLES. Kevin carries the stripes of Urbana High well and returns them with grace.



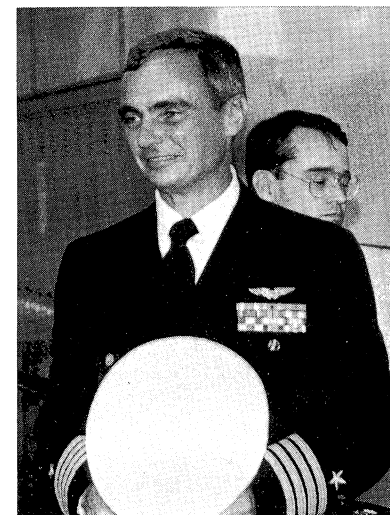
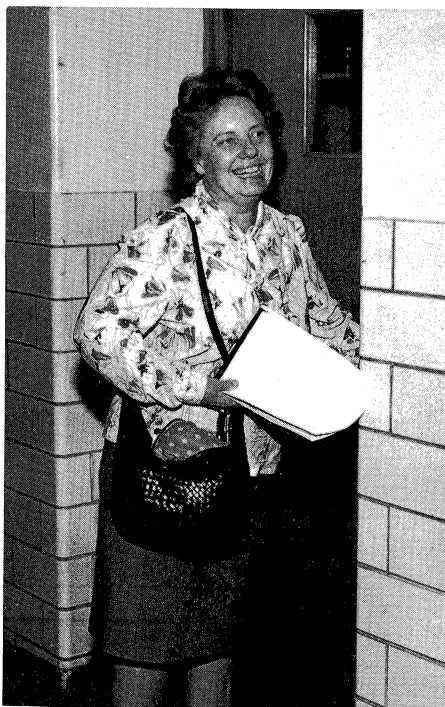

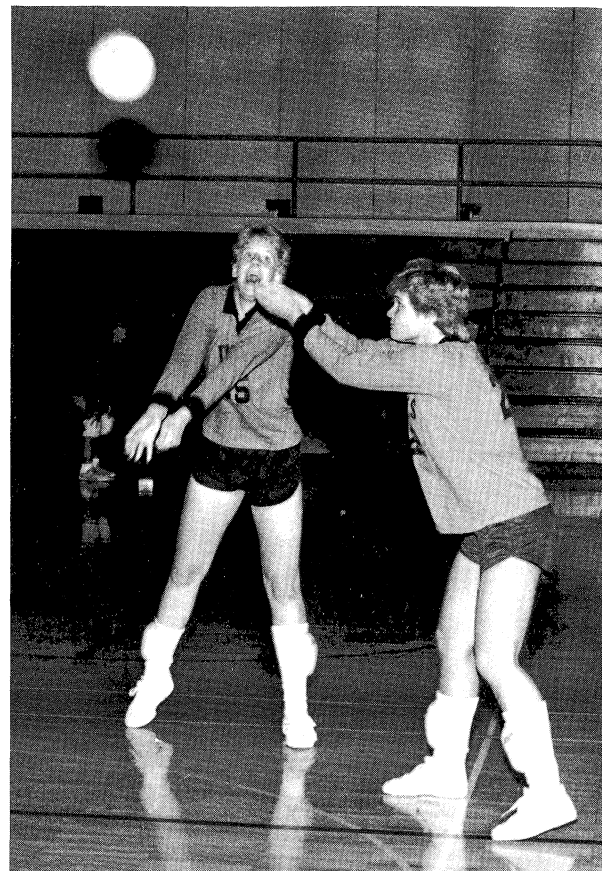


Play Gets Solid

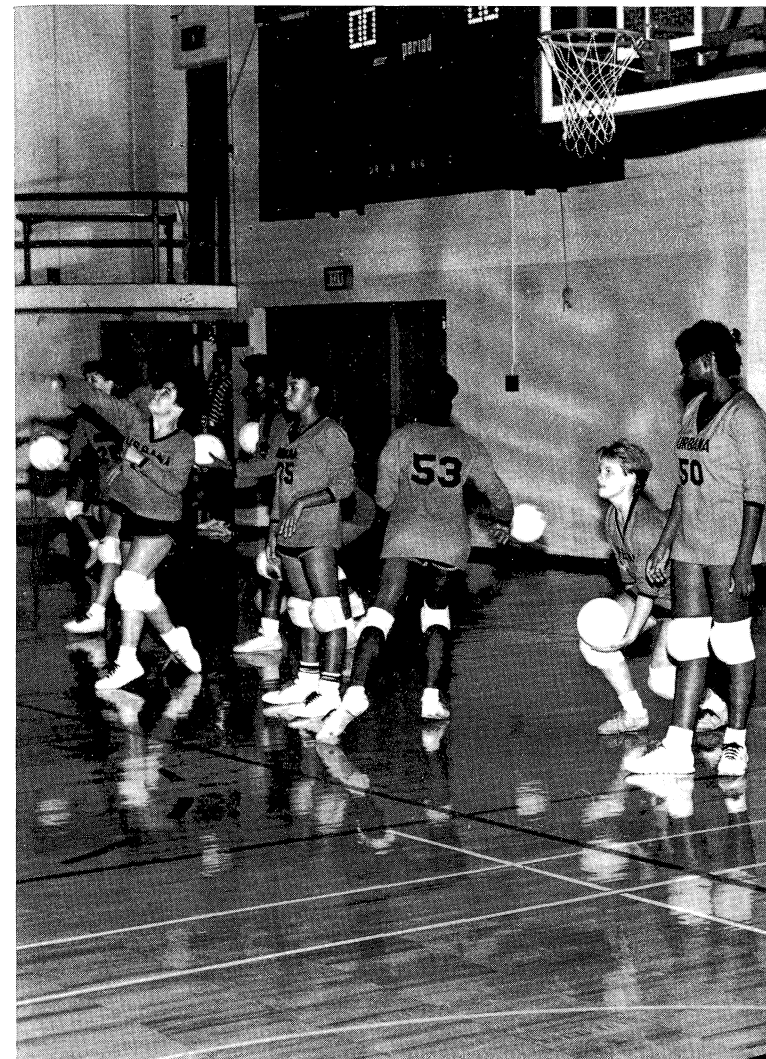

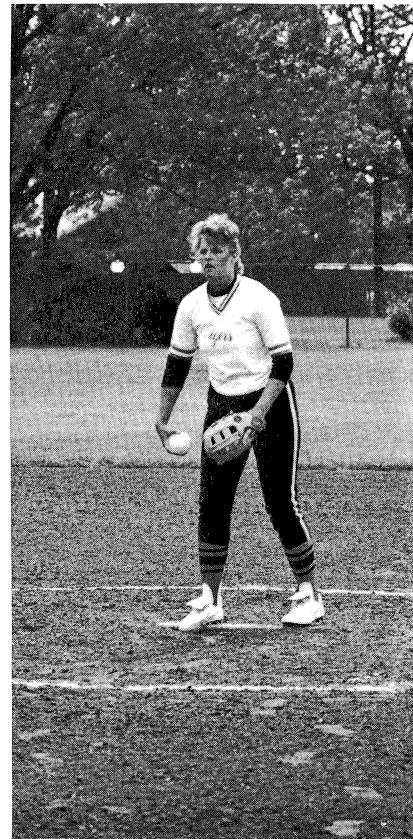

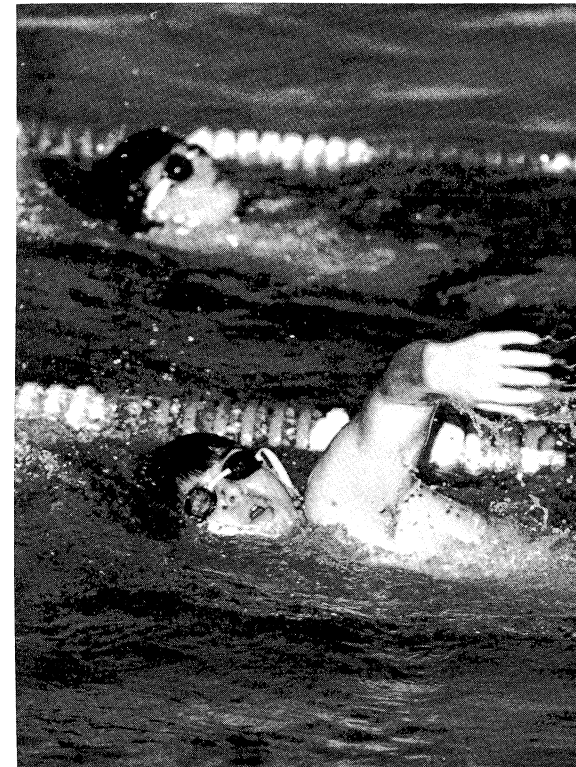

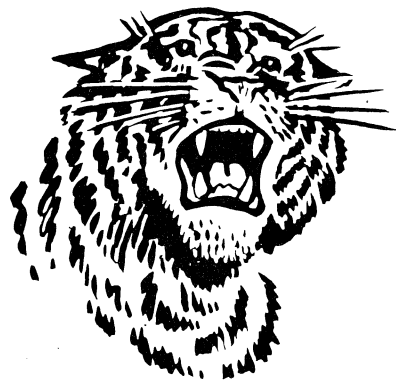

Guys and Dolls Roll High

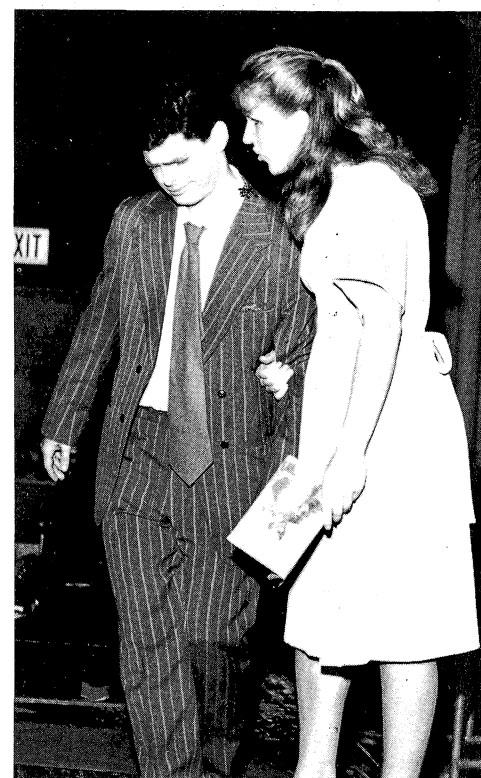

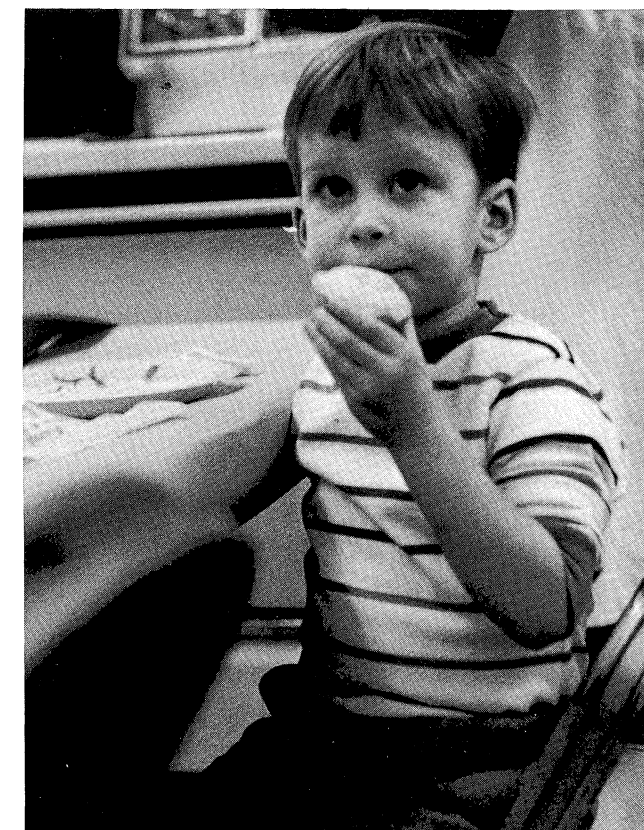

All Urbana High mourned this year the passing of Mr. Richard Thompson who died this past June on the day that the 1986 class followed his last "Line of March" for graduation. We have felt the loss this year. It is easy to get someone to take his job, but it is not easy to replace the qualities that Mr. Thompson used daily in his job. His many years of experience with Urbana students gave us expertise few could match. He began his career here as a student teacher in the science department in 1949. In 1954, he returned fulltime to teach. He began teaching biology courses and soon organized a program for exceptional students who needed a challenging program. In 1961 when Urbana became a three year school, he became Dean of Boys and Assistant Principal. At this point, he gave up a long time position as swimming teacher and coach. In 1962, he changed positions once more, becoming a counselor. In 1963, he was once again an assistant principal. Changing stripes in 1975 to become Chairman of Guidance attested to his valued versatility at our school. We will miss what Mr. Thompson taught us through his experience in our halls. We will remember him as one who had enough faith in his students to persevere and do all that he could do to make the high school years truly rewarding. Rosemary is for remembrance.
