The school year of 1988-89, like almost any other year, was filled with news and sports events, as well as fads. Below are a few of those items.




News

In international news, the U.S. had a clash with Libya in which two Libyan jets were shot down. Pan Am flight 103 was blown up over the village of Lockerbie, Scotland, killing everyone aboard, a Reagan-Gorbachev summit was cut short in December of '88 by a colossal earthquake in Armenia — over 20,000 people were killed. In addition, Soviet troops were pulled out of Afghanistan after nearly ten years of occupation.

In national news, the presidential election dominated the news for months, ending in George Herbert Walker Bush and Dan Quayle defeating Governor Michael Dukakis and Senator Lloyd Bentsen. And in January of '89, legislators bid farewell to Ronald Reagan after his 8-year term as president. In Novem-

ber, the country mourned the 25th anniversary of John F. Kennedy's assassination, and for months the country was stuck in the lingering drought that proved disastrous for many parts of the country.

In news closer to home, the government recommended the closing of the Chanute Air Force Base in Rantoul, making many area citizens begin the fight to keep it open, and Mercy and Burnham hospitals merged. And at UHS, there was controversy over the administration's policy on wearing caps backwards, as well as the district's teacher cutbacks. Attendance at sports events generally increased, and students finally gained their parking privileges.

Popular movies included Big. Cocktail, Who Framed Roger Rabbit, Raim Man. Working Girl, and Mississippi Burning.

Big music makers included U2.
R.E.M., Tracy Chapman, the mallduo of Debby Gibson and Tiffany, Gun in Roses, Edie Brickell and the New bohemians, Bobby McFerrin's "Don't Worty, Be Happy," the Bangles, the Replacements, and rap music gained much popularity (such as Tone Loc's "Wild

Thing").
In television, shows such as "Thirtysomething," "The Wonder Years, "The Cosby Show," "Roseanne," "Family, Ties," and "Wiseguy" were popular. Another big news-maker were the variety of talk shows, some of which were called 'trash TV. These shows gained a surge of controversy, and in turn, popularity. 
