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TO OUR LEGISLATORS

TO OUR LEGISLATORS

Gentlemen of the Illinois legislature, it is high time you were doing something about some of the disgusting, deplorable conditions which face members of the Race in Illinois, especially at the state university in Champaign. We are speaking directly now to Representatives Warren B. Douglas, Charles Griffin, George T. Kersey, S. H. Turner and Senator Adelbert H. Roberts. Through you gentlemen we address the entire legislature.

Conditions at Champaign are rotten, to say the least. And this applies to every other college town in this state. Do you know, gentlemen, that members of your Race, clean-cut, upstanding young men and women, cannot eat in one single decent restaurant in that city? Do you know that these places, operated chiefly by men who have hardly lost the mud of their peasant countries from their feet, or the dirt from their finger nails—men who know only enough of the language spoken in the United States to be able to refuse you service intelligently, are the ones who order you from their premises? Do you, gentlemen of the legislature, know that this is against the law of Illinois? Gentlemen, we ask, do you know these things, or is it that you are not interested?

The University of Illinois is supported by the state of Illinois. Every year you legislators discuss and make appropriations to that great institution. Why can't you, while you are conferring with representatives of the university on the subject of appropriations, ask them a few questions concerning these conditions? Yes, we know that the school has nothing to do with private restaurants and hotels, but we know also that these places could not operate if student patronage were withdrawn from them. We know that if the authorities at Champaign took an interest in these affairs, and ORDERED these operators to serve all citizens alike, they would be compelled to do so. It has been done at other universities, notably at the University of Michigan, where like conditions prevailed until the president, the late Marion L. Burton, issued a statement that the school authorities would close any restaurant or hotel refusing to serve all students. The color ban was immediately removed.

May we humbly suggest, dear legislators, that we have returned you to Springfield in the hope that you would interest yourselves in these conditions? Permit us to suggest further, that since it is our money as well as money of other Illinois citizens that goes to support the university, and to pay your salaries, that you take steps to remedy this situation at Champaign and Urbana—that you at least make an effort to remedy it? Thank you, sirs!

'FORGIVE OUR PREJUDICES!' IS NEW PRAYER

Rabbi, Priest, Pastor Are Its Authors

Urbana, Ill., March 4.—Rabbi, priest and minister have co-operated in formulating a prayer acknowledging the kinship of the faiths and the common Fatherhood of God. It was published on Feb. 24 by its authors, Rev. John A. O'Brien, pastor of St. John's Catholic church; Rabbi Benjamin Frankel, director of Hillel Foundation, and Rev. James C. Baker, pastor of the Trinity Methodist church, all of Urbana.

The prayer reads:

"Almighty God: We who are members of the different races and faiths desire together Thy Fatherhood and our kinship with each other. In our differences we find that many of our hopes, our fears, our aspirations are one. Thou art our Father and we are Thy children.

No Hatreds

"We are heartily sorry for the mists of fear, envy, hatred, suspicion and greed which have blinded our eyes and thrust us asunder.

"May the light that comes from Thee scatter these mists, cleanse our hearts and give health to our spirits, teach us to put away all bitterness and walk together in the ways of human friendship.

Honor All Races

"Open our eyes to see that as nature abounds in variation, so differences in human beings make for richness in common life. May we give honor where honor is due—regardless of race, color or circumstances. Deepen our respect for unlikeness and our eagerness to understand one another. Through the deeper unities of the spirit in sympathy, in sight and co-operation may we transcend our differences. May we gladly share with each other our best gifts and together seek for a human world fashioned in good under Thy guidance. Amen."

Zuppke Says Grid Tinkers Meet Too Often; Shift O. K.'d

Champaign, Ill., March 7.—The changes in the football rules this year are both constructive and destructive. In the opinion of Robert C. Zuppke, University of Illinois football coach, Zuppke, declaring that there is too much tinkering and changing, advocates that the committee meet only once in three years.

"The constructive legislation is in furthering the development of the lateral pass," said Coach Zuppke. "This probably will make a more interesting offense."

Too Much Legislation?

"On the other hand, the committee neutralized this process by discouraging the field goal. This is what I mean by destructive legislation. Evidently agitation over the point after touchdown started the ball rolling, but the point after touchdown situation remains the same and the field goal has suffered. If they wanted to legislate against the point after touchdown why didn't they move the team from the three-yard line to the 15-yard line?"

"Reviewing the course of the committee over several years, one cannot but feel that its legislation has been erratic. One year kicking is encouraged, the next year it is frowned on. Sooner or later they must stop tinkering with the rules and let them remain the same for a few years at least. Perhaps the best plan would be to permit the committee to meet only once in three years and have a smaller committee with no legislative power meet yearly to interpret the details. The rules are increasing all the time, which puts more and more burden on the officials."

Yost O. K.'s Shift Rule

Ann Arbor, Mich., March 7.—Coach Fielding H. Yost, commenting on the changes made by the football rules committee, made the following statement:

"The changes will alter materially the aspect of the game," especially from the spectators' standpoint. There will not be the same uncertainties to the spectator, coach, or player. Many of the thrills that have happened will not occur under the changed rules, but new styles of attack will be encouraged which may add many more thrills.

"No one, so far as I know, ever has suggested that all or any shifts be prohibited. The 'thing' placed in the rules after any shift is in line

with what was agreed to in the Western conference.

What About These Points?

"Two questions of fact are raised under the rule requiring the ball to be put in play 20 seconds after it is ready for play and 15 seconds in the huddle.

"1. When is the ball ready?"

"2. When does the huddle begin?"

"In other words, what is the huddle? How close do the men have to be together and in what position must they be? Certainly the officials must know what the huddle is before they can know when the 15 seconds limitation begins."

Phelan Hits Lateral Pass

Lafayette, Ind., March 7.—"The football rules committee has simply put into words what all legitimately shifting teams have been doing for years," said James Phelan, Purdue's football coach. In discussing changes adopted by the committee, Phelan uses the shift extensively at Purdue and with considerable success.

"A shift is a simple means of maneuvering men," said the Purdue leader. "There is no other purpose to the legal shift."

"The lateral pass rule, to my mind, means little. American football has proved that the direction to move is forward and not backward or laterally. The lateral pass is a weak offensive weapon."

Phelan expressed some doubt as to the effectiveness of moving the goal posts back ten yards.

"It has made the point after touchdown harder to get, but it also has handicapped the field goal kicker. I doubt if the end justifies the means. Under the new rule the old timers' field goal records no longer will be compared to the present day player and I regard this as regrettable."

Knute Backs Happy

Notre Dame, Ind., March 7.—Coach Knute K. Rockne favors the changes made by the football rules committee. Rockne stated today that he is pleased with the change made in the shift ruling. A two-second pause practically would have killed the shift but under the present legislation it retains its strategic advantages and must be highly perfected to avoid penalty.

Rockne said the backward pass seemed to be an experiment and will make officiating more complicated.

Mob Orders Family Off 'White' Street

Champaign, Ill., May 6.—Aroused over the moving of a family into an exclusively "white" residential district on Charles St., in the southern part of Champaign, a mob of angry whites set the stage for a race riot here Wednesday night. They stormed at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Foree and sought to drive the family out. Riot calls were sounded and the police reserves turned on the threatening mob. The Forees had just purchased the property at 107 Charles St.

Leslie Foree and his wife, Dora, although surrounded in their home, refused to be frightened by the mob. The whites bivouaced the premises while Mrs. Foree was alone. They had begun to form earlier in the evening, when two men residents of the district formed themselves into a committee and went from house to house enlisting the aid of other residents.

Incite Residents

"Niggers are moving into this block and we don't want them. Come and let's drive them out. We have got to keep our community strictly white," is what the committee of two is said to have explained while it made the house-to-house canvass.

There was a warm response. In a few minutes about 200 men, cursing and shouting, were swarming in the street on the way to the Foree home. The angry mob surged into the yard and to the front door. When Mrs. Foree answered the knock, the leader of the mob shouted:

"What do you mean by moving into our neighborhood? We don't want you here and you've got to get out. If you don't leave, there is going to be a whole lot of trouble. We're going to put you out if you and your husband don't leave at once."

While the leader of the mob issued his decree to Mrs. Foree, her friend went out the rear way and sum-

moned the police. In the meantime Mrs. Foree defied the mob by declaring:

"I've put too much money into this property to give it up. I've paid for this house and I am not leaving unless I get back every dollar I've paid for it."

This aroused the mob to a frenzy. The leader shouted curses and they surged forward menacingly, but were halted by the arrival of the police. After some effort the police dispersed the crowd of men, who reluctantly left the scene shouting threats and curses.

After they had scattered, Foree and relatives of the family joined Mrs. Foree. They were re-enforced by neighbors in the district who were not white. Then members of the white mob returned after the police had gone.

Trouble seemed imminent. Everybody was in a fighting mood when another call was sent for the police. Their timely arrival a second time prevented bloodshed. They ordered everyone off the streets. The mob members obeyed the order, but left warning the Forees to "get out."

Mr. and Mrs. Foree purchased the property two weeks prior to the trouble for \$2,250 from a white real estate agent at 209 N. Neil St. It had been occupied by a white family. The Forees are not the first family of the race to move into the neighborhood. Three other families live in the block, one of whom is Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Hines, 203 Charles St., who also own their home. Mrs. Foree was a roomer in the Hines home until she moved into the newly purchased property.

Commenting on the incident, Mrs. Foree said that she was terribly frightened when the mob approached her home, but she was determined to face them bravely and hold her own. "They didn't come into the house," she said, "but they were on my porch and many of them were in the street. I didn't know their intentions, but I faced them," Mrs. Foree said.

Mrs. Foree is a cook at Delta Pi Epsilon house. Her husband is a cook at the Southern tearoom. They assert that they don't want to make any trouble, but as far as the law is concerned, they know they have a right to stay there. However, they will give up the property if they can get back all the money they have put into it.

Is Illinois High

School Net King

Champaign, Ill., May 21.—Douglas Turner, Hyde Park high school, won the Illinois university state interscholastic tennis championship in the singles events by defeating his teammate and captain in a duel, both sets going over. The score was 8—6, 14—12. Captain Heyman leaped the net and grabbed the brown-skinned hand of his conqueror, and the two walked off the court with their arms around each other.

Turner is champion in the men's singles of the Prairie Tennis club of Chicago and was runner-up in the finals of junior singles at the national play of the American Tennis association at St. Louis last year. After losing the first set, 4—6, he returned to win the second, 8—6, and then fell out, overcome by heat in the final after leading.

His work on the courts has kept Hyde Park well up to the front in the Chicago High School league tennis race.

He is the first of his Race to become state champion.

POTATO SALAD

To four cups of cold boiled potatoes, diced, add one finely chopped onion, two canned pimentoes, cut into small pieces,

one-half cup finely-cut celery.

Take three hard-boiled eggs and separate the yolks from the whites. Dice the whites and add to the potato mixture.. Now add

one and three-fourths cups of cooked salad dressing, a little white pepper and a dash of cayenne pepper. If this salad is to be served from a salad bowl, line the bowl with lettuce leaves, fill with the salad and put the three egg yolks riced

over the top. If served in individual dishes, put a large crisp lettuce leaf on each dish or plate, put the salad on the leaf and sprinkle the riced egg yolks over the top.

GRAHAM COOKIES

One pound dates, one pound graham crackers, one pound marshmallows. Cut marshmallows and dates in fine pieces. Roll graham crackers until they are crumbs. Mix dates, marshmallows and graham crackers together until all are thoroughly mixed. Roll and put in ice box until hard. Cut in round slices and serve with whipped cream. This makes a very nice dessert and will keep several days.

Half pound peanut brittle, half pint coffee cream. Break peanut brittle into small pieces. Pour cream over it and beat with an egg beater until all the candy is soft. 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VOTERS TO WAR ON JIM CROW AT U. OF I.

Recently a woman with philanthropic intent, sent out 50 letters to citizens of Illinois asking each to contribute \$2 toward founding a home for women students at the University of Illinois. She received two replies and a total sum of \$4. No one else, it seemed, was interested in the situation at our state university, where our girls are forced to make their own arrangements if they attend the institution.

What voters are now asking, is responsible for this condition? For 30 years students of the Race who have gone to Champaign to school have been subjected to all sorts of humiliations and discomforts. Restaurants, both on and off the campus, refuse to serve them; the women are barred from dormitories where women of every other race are permitted to live. Although the University of Illinois makes strict rules for women students, where they shall live and the conditions under which they are to remain at the institution, no effort is made to apply these rules to our women. They live out in Champaign and Urbana wherever they can find accommodations. In many instances they are forced to walk miles to get food because restaurants refuse to serve them.

The voters of Illinois are now asking what our legislators are doing? Every year a legislative committee visits the university. Every year they vote taxpayers' money for its maintenance. They could, if they were interested, demand that this segregation be wiped out. But to date they have not done so. Voters are now demanding that some action be taken. If our representatives at Springfield are too busy or too white-livered to look into this matter and remedy the situation, then the voters plan to retire them and send some others to Springfield. The school at Champaign, which uses millions of dollars paid by all citizens yearly must be made a democratic institution. Those in authority must be forced to recognize all students and to give them the comforts provided for them by citizens of this state. And this is the job of our legislators! If they can't perform it, they ought to get out of the way and let some one take their places who can and will!
