Changes in the CME Church

Actions That Are Headed for the CME 2010 Book of Discipline*

The 37th General Conference of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church was held June 26-July 4, 2010 in Mobile, AL. Emerging from the Conference were some very important pieces of legislation that will appear in the CME 2010 Book of Discipline. Some of the legislation passed is as follows:

Resolution 2010-02-05: That the title "President" of the Board of Christian Education be eliminated and replaced with the title "Director." The duties of the President of the Board would be incorporated under those of the director.

Action: Passed, with change that the title "vice president" of the Board of Christian Education would be changed to "assistant director."

Resolution 2010-02-07: That the Discipline specifically state that members of the local Stewards Board are to assist in the collection or raising of General Funds.

Action: Passed

Resolutions 2010-06-49 and 2010-06-50: Changing names of Regional Lay Department and Local Lay Ministry to Regional Lay Council and Lay Council at the local church. Action: Passed with changes.

Resolution 2010-06-54: Establish a Connectional Ushers' Day as the second Sunday in September.

Action: Passed

Resolution 2010-06-55: Deletion of "Christian Methodist Men's Fellowship" from the CME Discipline.

Action: Passed

These are only representative of legislation that was passed during the 37th General Conference. Typically, Disciplines are published and ready for sale the year following the General Conference. Each officer and member of the local church should be prepared to purchase a Discipline at a nominal fee when they become available.

Know Your History: Lane College



Lane College is a small, private, co-educational, church-related four-year institution, which provides a liberal arts curriculum leading to baccalaureate degrees in the Arts and Sciences. In 1882, Lane College, then the "C.M.E. High School," was founded by the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church in America. Looking to the establishment of this enterprise as early as November 1878, Reverend J.K. Daniels presented a reso-



lution to establish a school at the Tennessee Annual Conference held in the old Capers Chapel C.M.E. Church in Nashville, Tennessee, and presided over by Bishop William H. Miles, the first Bishop of the C.M.E. Church. The resolution was adopted amid much applause. The Conference at once appointed a committee to solicit means with which to purchase grounds and to inaugurate plans to carry forward the proposed work. Reverends C.H. Lee, J.H. Ridley, Sandy Rivers, and J.K. Daniels constituted this committee. The institution began its first session in November 1882, as the "C.M.E. High School," with Miss Jennie E. Lane, daughter of the Founder, Bishop Isaac Lane, as the first teacher.

Lane College is proud of its tradition of providing educational opportunities for those who may not otherwise have had the opportunity to attend college. It places priority on academic excellence, but is equally as concerned about the student's spiritual, social, and ethical development. Lane College is committed to preparing students, through its liberal arts curriculum, to assume meaningful positions in their chosen occupations or professions and/or to pursue graduate studies. This is done through a guided, nurturing program of intellectual experiences that enables students to identify and develop their "Power of Potential." Lane's tradition includes first-generation college students who have genuinely transcended their circumstances. The motto, "esse non videri": "to be, not to seem" is evident in its alumni who have become successful attorneys, physicians, educators, entrepreneurs, and scientists throughout the nation and the world. Since its inception, Lane College has strongly believed in the "Power of Potential." This is achieved in an environment that is sensitive and nurturing, but challenges students to achieve new levels of excellence at the same time.
