

'Today I ask God to meet me at the office door, and sit with me all day'. AMEN



Leroy Barnes' Red Sox



National Negro Baseball League Recognition Day "Honoring Our Local Players"

This past spring the cities of Champaign and Urbana held a National Negro Baseball League Recognition Day on May 4, 2008. The purpose of the event was to recognize the teams and players of the **Negro Baseball Leagues** for their achievements, dedication, sacrifices and contributions to both baseball and our nation. The Leroy Barnes Red Sox, a minor team of the Negro Baseball League, located in Champaign, Illinois was honored as well.

One of the team members honored was Vernon Lewis, Sr. the captain of the Leroy Barnes' Red Sox Team. The statistics on the baseball card printed by the Early American History Museum, indicate that he was a pretty good baseball player. Vernon Lewis, also known as "Zip" because her ran so fast, was a member of St. Luke CME Church

His handiwork as a professional plasterer can still be seen on all the walls in St. Luke's sanctuary. After the church was damaged by fire, "Zip" devoted his time, labor and materials to help restore the sanctuary by plastering the walls free of charge. Many evenings Zip, along with sons, Rodney and Billy, could be found at the church helping Rev. A.W. Bishop rebuild the choir loft as well.

During a conversation with son, Billy Lewis, he recalled an incident that ended their trips with their dad to St. Luke to help out with the church renovation.

A recent email from, Rodney, recalls the incident as well:

Pat,

The only thing that I remember is that Billy and I were helping Pastor Bishop remove the old altar area prior to building the new choir loft and the back meeting rooms. Billy and I were above and Pastor Bishop was in the basement area. We were letting a large timber down to him and he told us to let it go. We did and it nearly impaled him.

The other thing is that when our father plastered the church he paid his laborer Robbie out of his own pocket. He was generous that way. He did the same for Horace and Myrtle Chatman after Horace had his heart attack and could no longer work. Good memories! Thanks for letting me share them.
