Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People

NAME.

1. This organization shall be known as the

My dear Mrs. Thompson:

We are sending you under separate cover in a carton the constitution of the Twin City Branch, Champaign and Urbana, Ill., which was approved by our Board of Directors at its last meeting, May 10. The charter will follow. This constitution will enable you to get to work at once, and we should suggest your immediately electing permanent officers and appointing the committees mentioned in Sections 6 and 7.

Each month in the Crimin you will read under N.A.A.C.P.
Notes reports of branches, and we shall expect e report from you on your activities every month. This should reach us by the first of the month in order to get in the Crimin for the next month. We do not publish plans for branch work but only results. We are very glad to welcome you as a branch of the Association and shall be happy to cooperate with you in every possible way. Yo not hesitate to call upon us.

Niss Johnson, our field agent, in estimating the proportion of money due the branch made a slight mistake. I believe she has written you about this. The proportion of the branch is fifty cents of each member's fee - not fifty par cent. In other words, if a member contributes one dollar the branch's proportion is fifty cents; if he contributes five dollars its proportion is fifty cents, and the balance goes to the Association. Anyone contributing two dollars or more gets the Crisis on that membership. This does not mean, however, that if the branch wishes to raise money for any special purpose it may not do so.



My dear Miss Woodruff:

Your letter of April 12 to Mr. Johnson has been referred to me for attention. I have read carefully your statement relative to the alleged cruel treatment of colored children in the Champaign schools. I suggest that as strong a committee of local citizens (and if you can get some fair minded upstanding white people to serve on the committee, it will strengthen your case, I am sure) as it is possible to get, meet with the School Board on May first. It seems to me that it would be wisest for you to draft carefully a statement to the Board which can be presented in writing at this meeting. In that statement, I would suggest that you itemize the cases which can be definitely proved.

Request the Board to take such steps as to prevent recurrences of such incidents.

Ask for disciplining of the offending teachers.

State respectfully, but strongly, that unless the Board takes such steps as would end such practices, the colored people of Champaign will be forced to take oriminal or civil action, or both, for the protection of colored children.

May I. however, utter one word of caution. In framing the message and in your presentation of the demands upon the School Board, do not permit any intimation to creep in that the colored people of Champaign want or will tolerate segregated schools. I am sure you will appreciate this fact and I also am certain that it is not necessary for me to emphasize it. I mention it because we have had numerous experiences where such practices in abusing colored children were used as a preliminary towards creating ill feeling that would lead to a demand for segregated schools.

All of the above points have no doubt occurred to you but I hope you will keep after this practice until it is eliminated. Please let us know if we can be of any further assistance.

Every year we assign to our several branches their apportionments and membership quotas. As the Champaign Branch, being newly organized may not know what we mean when we speak of a branch's apportionment and quota, we are sending this word of explanation.



Mr. Bagnall is now in the South and I am therefore replying to your letter of February 16th. Fortunately, Mr. Pickens who is now in Indiana is to be in Champeign on March 7th. I suggest that you get together a group of interested persons to meet with Mr. Pickens on that date with a view towards forming a College Chapter of the N.A.A.C.P. I suggest that you get in touch also with the local Branch, of which Mr. M. B. Walker, 518 Horth Hickory Street, is the Secretary, to arrange the hour for the meeting which will not conflict with plans which the Branch has already made. I am sending copies of this correspondence to Mr. Pickenm and to the Secretary of the Champaign Branch.

Now as to the discrimination in restaurants in the college district and the refusal of the Illinois Union to give a room to a Hegro student who had previously made magotiations for the room. I enclosed copy of a letter dated January 26th from President Harry W. Chase, written in response to a protest from our Mr. Seligmann to the editorial, "On the Mob Instinct" which appeared in the Daily Illini, following the recent Maryville lynching. This letter impressed us as being unequivocal. I believe that President Chase would land a receptive ear to protest on the matter of discrimination since the lynching.

I suggest that a delegation of Negro students which, if there are any fair-minded ones you know, could profitably include white students, should call upon the President and present frankly to him the facts in this matter of discrimination and ask the University to take steps to correct it.

My dear Mr. Fisher:

We are pleased to learn of your interest in organizing a branch of the Association at the University of Illinois and trust that your efforts may meet with success.

Literature and organization material is being sent you under separate cover. You will note that fifty members are required as a minimum for chartered branches and that the annual membership fee is from \$1.00 a year upward. Persons who pay \$2.50 or more receive The Crisis.

We would suggest that you get as large a committee as possible to take up the work of organization, having the committee select temporary officers who will serve until the permanent branch is organized. The committee should arrange and advertise weekly meetings at which memberships will be solicited and new workers entlated in the canvass for members. If you can get ten or lifteen workers who will pledge to bring in at least five members each within a certain period of time, you will be able to apply for a charter very soon.

College chapters follow the regular Branch Constitution, except where it differs in the sections and articles listed in the enclosed pamphlet. The principal difference between the college units and regular branches is that the latter are held responsible for a certain definite amount to be contributed annually to the work of the National Office. This is not required of branches in educational institutions.

Please keep us informed regarding the progress you are able to make and let us know anything we can do to help get a good unit of the N.A.A.C.P. under way in the University of Illinois.

I want to commend the branch in Champaign for the stand which it has taken and urge that the branch tegether with the citisens of Champaign; who may not be connected with the Association, pool all of their efforts both financial and moral, to the end that every person guilty of the assault upon this boy will be duly punished and every person or agent who may be responsible, suffer the consequences of the assault. Now with regard to the white lawyer's remark. I am unable to give an opinion, but I feel that if Attorney Dickerson thoroughly investigates and properly conducts the matter, as I feel that he will, the boy and his family will not be forced to suffer this indignity without some sort of recompense. Here at the National Office, I shall give you every assistance which I possibly can. Considering the office's distance from Champaign. I shall be glad to advise with you and to be kept in touch with every development of the matter. This case ought to be one which will make the citizens of Champaign realize the necessity of having an active branch of the Association there. You asked about the costs in the case. It would be unfair for me to set a fee which I think Mr. Dickerson, or any other attorney whom you employ, ought

My dear Mr. Gray:

Your letter of May 25th has just come, and we feel that you are quite right in your attitude towards the way in which the courts have treated the indictment of the white man who killed a colored man in Champaign last December. If there was sufficient evidence for the coroner's jury to recommend that the white man be held for murder, and if, in addition, the grand jury indicted that man fur murder and refused him bond, certainly there seems to be sufficient reason for seeing that he goes to trial.

Our suggestion is that the branch appoing a committee to call upon the state's attorney for a specific statement as to the reasons for dismissing the case. We would suggest that you recite specifically, as you did in your letter to us, the presence of the three witnesses who saw the shooting, and who testified before the coroner's and the grand juries, and ask him point blank how he can give the excuse that in his opinion there will be little chance of a conviction, since the man is going to plead self-defense. Upon receiving a statement from the state's attorney, or in the event that after a reasonable time he does not give a satisfactory excuse, we recommend that you take the matter up with the attorney-general of the state and the governor. It will be well, of course, to have at least for consultation the services of a reputable and honest lawyer.

Please keep us advised as to developments and let us know if we can help.

Dear Sir:

The Branch here has been very inactive, but there is always something that has to happen, either for the best or worst to wake them up. And the thing has happened, and of course now the folks here are all up in arms about it.

It is a long story, but I will try to tell it as short as possible. Last Saturday night, two weeks ago, eight boys, ranging in ages from 19 to 22, all respectable boys of high families, went to a local theater here. This theater is not particular about Colored people attending. One boy bought all of the tickets, and when the boys took their seats, their seats were down towards the front. The head usher came up with a policeman and told them they would have to move. So the boys told them before they would move they would have their money refunded. So they went to the box office to get their money. In the meantime, the usher was saying mean things trying to create a distrubance. When they were given their money, the manager told the policeman to get those black "s.b." out of there. The policeman (who was a city policeman) ducked under the chain in the lobby, and pulled out his gun and struck one of the boys on the head. When the boy turned and asked him what he had done, the policeman told him he was going to make an example of him for the rest of the smart niggers in this town. And told him he was going to take him "down". The policeman took him down to the station, which was only three blocks, the rest of the boys going along. The desk sargent asked him what he was booked for; the policeman said, disorderly conduct. One of the boys with the bunch offered to put up a cash bond for the boy. But the policeman told him if he didn!t shut up he would throw him in jail., and would not let him go the bond. They threw the boy under arrest, in a cell. And when one of the other policeman came in off of beat, the policeman that had made the arrest told the policeman that they had a spunky nigger in the cell and they were going to take the spunk out of him just as soon as they got rid of the rest of the niggers. This policeman went to the cell door and looked in and called the boy a half-breed-----. The boy in the cell resented this and told him if he did not have a star and gun on him he would make him take that back. At this remark, the policeman got the cell keyes, unlocked the cell, and went in the cell to beat the boy up. But the boy was too much for him, so three other policeman went to his rescue. And they beat the boy unmercifully, pulling his collarbone out of place. In the meantime, one of the boys on the outside of the cell asked the night captain, who was present, if he could not make the policeman stop beating the boy. He stated he couldn't do hothing about it. In the meantime one of the boys had gone after the boy's mother. When she came, she offered to give bond, as the boy was screaming and crying, but they told her she could not give bond. So she asked permission to get a doctor for the boy. They told her that no

doctor could go in the cell that night. So the boy's mother started out to the police magistrate's house at one oclock in the morning to see if she could not give bond. The police magistrate immediately called the police sargent and told them to accept her bond and that they would have to get a doctor for the boy. When the mother got back to the city building the police had called the city health officer and they were putting the boy in an ambulance to take him to the hospital. When they got to the hospital the mother called in another doctor, who was Colored. And they had an X-ray taken, and it showed his collarbone had been pulled out of place. After a consultation with two other highly respected white doctors, they claimed the boy may have a crippled hand for life.

Later the next day, the police captain called on the mother and told her if she did not say anything about the affair, the city would pay the doctor and hospital bill, and it would be all over with. As it would only make trouble for her if she tried to start anything. The same policeman who beat up the boy and arrested him, had just been on trial the week before for beating up a white man. There were three white witnesses in the jail who saw the policeman go in the cell and beat the boy and are more than willing to testify, and they tell the same story that the boy tels.

One white lawyer here told a committee that you could not beat the city. That the police were going to tell that the boy was unruly, and his collarbone was pulled out of place when they were trying to put him in the cell.

What I am writing to you about, is this: Of course when anything like this happenes, indignation meetings are held and everything else is done. Now the Branch wants to know, that is they have asked me and I told them I would have yo write to you. How much it would cost if the N. A. A. C. P. would help to fight the case. The folks got busy here and had a Colored attorney down from Chicago, Earl B. Dickerson, and he said he would carry the case through, as there was no way to lose, but suggested, that since there was an N. A. A. C. P. here that we see what they would do as it would give more prestige to the case. Hence I an writing to you, to see what help you would give, and how much it would cost:

Of course, we are not doing it just for this boy, but this same set of policemen, have killed a Colored man, and beat up two others, and nothing was ever done about it. Also this theater have had Colored people thrown out without cause. And if we never do anything about it, worst than this will happen.

So I would be glad if you would give me information at once, with reference to the matter.

Such is our case. Now, Mr. Pickens, is there anyway we can organize the type of branch we desire. Please let me hear from you as soon as possible as we are anxiously waiting your reply.

My dear Mr. Forter: I am replying to your letter of December Of course you can organize a branch to include both college students and town people, a regular branch where the minimum membership is one dollar a year. The students could take the lead in organizing the branch and invite the cooperation of the townspeople and try to get as many of them into the Branch as possible. I can understand your reasons for not wanting simply a college chapter or a youth council. Grown-up young people can do very effective work with a regular branch. I suggest that you send an invitation to all the ministers, doctors, and other leaders among the colored people and any white people whom you can approach, inviting them to come together with you for an organization meeting. The first thing is to get a half dozen or more people to cooperate with you on a committee for organizing. Twenty-five members can organize a branch, but it will take fifty members to get a permanent charter. Anticipating that you will want to get busy at once in organizing this branch. I am sending you, under separate cover, fifty membership envelopes and some other literature of the Association. I would distribute these membership envelopes about five each to ten persons, responsible people, in the University and in the town, and ask them to try to get four other memberships besides their own. In that way we might immediately get fifty members and apply for a regular charter from the national Board of Directors. Be sure to write me immediately for any further help you may wish. Perhaps you may wish to have a mass meeting, but I advise that we have by all means a conference of the Executive Committee and other officers and members of the Association where we can more intimately consider the interests of the Branch and the work of the year. 

If a good case can be made in Champaign-Urbana, it should be prosecuted under the leadeship of the National office.

The restaurants and show places in the town, and those in the neighborhood of the University which cater especially to University people, discriminate brutally against Negro students. There is a civil rights law in Illinois, and Representative King tell, me in Springfield that they are aiming at a law now with real "teeth" in it.

We should include this situation in our general legal attack on "Discrimination", with the aid of the Fund from The American Fund for Social Service, or whatever the Garland Fund is now called.

ALL ILLINOIS HAS ITS EYES ON THIS SITUATION IN THE UNIVERSITY TOWN. It will greatly redound to the benefit of the Association and its branches in Illinois if something effective is done, or attempted.

The Office can get into touch with the temporary officers in Champaign, Urbana. I have sent their names and addresses to the Office.

A good case ought to be taken up there.

In December of 1924, or about seven months ago, a white man killed a Colored man here, seemingly for nothing. There were three colored witnesses who saw the shooting. A coroner jury recommended that the white man be held for murder. At the setting of the grand jury, he was also indicted for murder. He was not allowed bond at first, but just after the election of the States Attorney, who was re-elected, he was immediately let out on bond.

Last week, his trial was to come up, to be exact it was to come up in the criminal court, Tuesday May 19. But the States Attorney who should have fought the case for the state, when before the Judge and nollified the case, had it dropped after the grand jury had indicted this man for murder. The States attorney's excuse for having the case dropped from the docket was, that it would cost the county a lot of expense to have the trial, and it seemed like the case would be lost, on account of the white man was going to plead self-defense, and the states attorney didn't think there could be enough witnesses found to dispute the fact that it was self defense; (even thought three witnesses had seen the shooting, and had been questioned by the coroner's jury and the grand jury, and these witnesses' testimony had satisfied both these juries enough to hold the man for murder; and yet the States attorney didn't think there would be sufficient evidence to warrant having a trial before a jury). There seems like something could be done about this, and I am writing you to find out what steps to take.

Urbana branch jointly with the MYE has spensored the opening of a library "for colored people" in North 5th Street. We are inquiring about the whole situation with respect to the library in your city because it is a little odd, to say the least, to have a branch of the NAACP in a northern community in a state which has a civil rights law. eponsor a special library for colored people. If library facilities are completely denied colored people it is the task of our branch in such a community th institute proper proceedings to secure those facilities: for colored people and not to sponsor a separate project. We call your attention to the fact that recently in Alexandria, Va., a determined fight was carried on in the courts with the result that an old law and custom barring Negroes from library facilities was overthrown. As long as Illinois has laws which declare colored people would be entitled to equal facilities (whether they actually enjoy those facilities or not) we expect our branches to fight these issues on the basis of the law, and not to acquiesce in any way in a jim-orow arrangement. Our national office staff and the board of directors will appreciate having a prompt explanation of the report that the branch has sponsored this separate library. Because of this, the Field Staff of the Association is trying to visit every possible branch within the next few months in an effort to strengthen the branches, to help with their programs and to gear up local machinery to meet these new conditions. Your branch is one of those assigned to me for a visit on Saturday and Sunday, November 22-25rd. At this time we could plan not only to have a gigantic public meeting, but also a meeting with the executive committee of the branch so that we can discuss these problems face to face. We want this visit to be more than a perfunctory thing. We want the branches to be stronger and more enlightened on methods and procedure when the visit is over. As is customary, we are asking you to contribute the sum of \$10.00 toward my traveling expenses. This money will be credited to your apportionment. Because of our slender budget, the only way we can get an officer on the road to visit the branches is by having each branch make a reasonable contribution toward this effort. Please do not put this decision off, but send a reply as promptly as possible, letting me know if the branch can use my services on the date offered. It will be necessary for me to leave the national office no later then the next ten days, and obviously my schedule must be completed long before that.
