# Soul food: Savory and satisfying

For The Courier

Soul food, a variety of wellseasoned and savory ethnic years, has recently been "rediscovered." Soul food church suppers and fashionable restaurants promoting soul food now abound.

Soul food originated southern plantations well before the Civil War. Parts of hogs, cows and chickens as well as vegetable greens that plantation owners would not eat were given to the slaves. In preparing them, the slaves invented some interesting and tasteful dishes.

"Most soul food is boiled with the exception of fried chicken, but we do prepare many chicken dishes after the chicken has been boiled." said Mrs. Marion Jones, a well known cook, "The only secret I can give for frying chicken is to use lard in-stead of the cooking oils on the market today," she said.

"You must make sure your skillet and lard are very hot before adding chicken that has been shaken in a paperbag filled with flour and plenty of salt and pepper. This is all I do when frying chicken, but I can't convince some of my white friends of that."

Variety of greens Greens for soul food include turnip, dandelion and mustard greens, collard and

The best time for dandelion greens is in the early spring before the flower has started to form. Country dandelions are much better and most preferred for cooking and though many also cook the roots, Marion prefers just the tops. She said collard is best in fall, following the first frost, and wild mustard greens are best in May and June.

When preparing greens Marion mixes turnip and mustard greens together. She considers the greens from the turnips too bitter to use alone and believes the mustard sweetens them a bit.

The greens are boiled in

rolled sugar cookies and decorated them with Christmas sugar candies.

At a special meeting at the home of Mrs. John Mize the girls made Christmas wall hangings for their own homes. A Christmas skating party at the U. of I. ice rink was held during the holidays with refreshments served by Mrs. Earl Sandberg and Mrs.

pepper pod and cooked with either ham hocks, bacon ends or salt pork.

A strong believer in using red pepper pods, Marion boils almost all her soul food with pods. For making 20 pounds of chitterlings, she adds two or three pods, a couple of large white onions and a cup of vinegar.

"It is most important to clean the chitterlings before adding to boiling water," she stated. "Just scrape the excess fat and boil with the onion, vinegar and pepper for 21. hours "

Time important

Time is an important factor when preparing pork. To fix pigs' feet with ears, add the ears forty-five minutes after the feet have been boiling. As with chitterlings, the meat should be cooked 212 hours.

Blackeved peas and cole slaw compliment the flavor of these boiled meat dishes and complete a soul food dinner.

"State Street Chicken" is not one of Marion's favorites. The recipe calls for boiling the neck of either a swine or cow with white potatoes. "This is one of the most popular ways of preparing soul potatoes, and is on many State Street menus in Chi cago," Marion explained.

Cornbread is also another popular soul food. Mix together 1 cup cornmeal, 4 tablespoons flour, one tablespoon sugar and one egg. Mix with enough milk or wa ter to form a mixture that can be poured easily into a greased pan or muffin tins. Bake at 400 degrees for at least 15 minutes.

For breakfast

Using the same ingredients for cornbread, substituting a smaller amount of boiling water for milk, stir the ingredients into a stiffer mixture. Once this has cooled for a few minutes, form the mixture into a loaf like shape with your hands. Slice into quarter-inch slices and brown lightly in hot lard and serve as a bread. It can be served

"The greens and meats can be purchased in local stores, and are not hard to spot on the counters of larger grocery stores. Since the trend in cooking these foods has changed in the past several years, the greens and meat scraps are no less exular vegetables today," Marion said. She also emphasized. "we do eat the same food as white folks. Soul food dishes were enjoyed by our elders and have become more of a tradition with our people."

Doctor Ellis was born Dec. 31, 1894, in Springfield. He was graduated from the University of Illinois school of medicine and interned at Provident Hospital, Chicago. He had been located in Champaign for 22 years, with offices at 112 North Walnut Street. He resided at the Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity house, 707 South Third Street, of which he was a member.

A veteran of World War I, he served in the 370th infantry regiment, the most decorated regiment of the war. He was a charter member of the William F. Earnest Post 559, American Legion, and was treasurer of the post at the time of his death.

Mrs. Trelease of 713 W. Oregon St. died at 2 p. m. Friday in McKinley Hospital after a lingering illness. She had been admitted to the hospital Tuesday.

Mrs. Trelease, known to hundreds of University alumni and remembered for her work with and influence on individual students, had been on the University of Illinois English faculty since 1920.

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For a number of years, in 1950 and later, Mrs. Trelease was coordinator for the Festival of Contemporary Arts on the U. of I. campus.

Mrs. Trelease's death came after lingering illness. She was hos-talized at West Suburban Hosa Ingering interpolation at Ingering pitalized at West Suburban Hospital, Oak Park, for the first time early in 1954, and had been in McKinley Hospital at intermittent periods. She was on leave of absence from the U. of I. during her illness.

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She re-entered McKinley Hospital
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last Tuesday.

Mrs. Trelease was born March 26, 1894, in Decatur, a daughter of Owen Homer Fullenwider and Jennie Ragland Fullenwider. Her early childhood was spent in Mechanicsburg, but she later returned to Decatur, where she attended the old Millikin Academy and Millikin University.

In 1916 Mrs. Trelease was graduated from Millikin University, where she was a member of Delta Delta Delta social sorority. She then came to the U. of I. and took her master's in 1917.

Mrs. Trelease taught at Decatur High School three years joining the University of Illinois faculty in 1920. She was an associate in English, later rising to the rank of associate professor.

Besides her husband, she leaves two sisters, Mrs. Agnes Armstrong, Decatur, and Mrs. Harmon Nash, Shelbyville, Ky., and one nephew.

In 1951 Mrs. Trelease became the first woman to win the Brown Derby award of Signa Delta Chi

Derby award of Sigma Delta Chi, journalistic fraternity, as the University's most effective teacher.

She was cited as the person who had brought the most distinction to the U. of I. during the year. She was credited for being instrumental in broadening the 1951 Festival of Contemporary Arts to





## Contest Preceeds 1956 **Fund Drive**

A contest to find the Easter Seal Child of 1956 was recently opened by the Lake County Society for Crippled Children in connection with this year's campaign to raise \$30,000 during the annual Easter Seal drive, March 10 thru April 10.

Stephen Fulka, society president, announced that contest applications will be accepted up to Friday. He said any child residing in the county between the ages of 4 and 16 with a physical handicap is eligible to enter the contest.

#### Goal 30 Per Cent Higher

The winner and five other finalists will take an aerial tour of Chicago and will visit air force jet pilots at O'Hare field. The winner will present the first sheet of Easter seals to Rep. Madden [D., Ind.] March 10.

Fulka said this year's goal is 30 per cent higher than last year's. He said the society hopes to accommodate 200 physically handicapped children in the county's five therapeutic centers. Last year, 153 victims of orthopedic ailments were treated in Lake county, Fulka said.

In his annual report, Fulka announced that the county's centers are primarily financed by Easter seal donations. A gross income of \$53,135.82 was taken in last year. Of this amount, Fulka added, \$21,518.up was provided by Easter


The county's five centers are operated by 740 volunteer workers, five graduate therapists, a full time teacher, and a secretary.



NEW YORK. -(SNS)- Joe Louis earned \$55,989 eight-round knockout victory of Arturo Godoy at the Yankee Stadium Thursday night. He got his check from Promoter Mike Jacobs' office Friday

Godoy received \$23,620 for the lashing he took from the champion. Statistics showed that 27,786 persons paid \$149 -505 to see Louis successfully defend his heavyweight title for the eleventh time. The net receipts were \$125,680, the federal tax, \$15,665 and the stateshare \$8,994.

Promoter Jacobs announced Friday that Louis' next defense of his world's heavyweight title will be in September, against the winner of the Tony Galento-Max Baer bout. Baer and Galento will clash in Jersey City on July 2. If Galento wins, Jacobs said he'll meet Louis in New York but if Baer is the victor the fight will take place in Chicago.
