
At any rate, whatever the event may include, it is sure to be marked by that certain quality which makes the teenage world, truly, an own world within itself.




Fads and Fashions




"Beat Urbana Week"




Homecoming













Two of the highest honors paid to Seniors are election to Boys' or Girls' State and selection as a National Merit Scholarship winner.

Girls' and Boys' State allow exceptional high school students to become state politicians for one week. They are given the opportunity to take part in elections of local and state officials, attend mock political conventions, petition for candidacy, observe the various duties of state officials, associate with the party of their choice, and attend lectures aimed at livening the students' interest in state politics. The National Merit Scholarship was originated approximately ten years ago by numerous colleges and business organizations that wished to give financial aid to outstanding students so that they might attend a college or university. Those students applying for the scholarship begin the testing program in their junior year. Those who score highest receive either letters of recommendation, which are useful in applying for colleges, or scholarships ranging from \$850 to \$6,000. Champaign High was proud to have Barb Britton as a national semi-finalist this year.



Exchanges

Each year Champaign High sends one teenage ambassador to a foreign country and several throughout the state in exchange for representatives from other schools. It is through these exchanges that we gain a clearer insight into the lives of students in other places.

Every year a junior boy or girl from CHS is carefully selected to represent our school in a European country. In order to be sent abroad, he must first fill out a questionnaire, and then be screened by a special panel of twenty-two faculty members and students. Finally the names of the semi-finalists are sent to the International Student Placement where the finalist is chosen. This year CHS is participating in a new program which will allow one of our students to study for a semester in a foreign school.

Not only are we anxious to learn about life in other countries, but we also feel there is still much to be learned about others in Illinois. For this reason our school participated in five intrastate exchanges this year. The exchanges took place between CHS and the schools of Glennbard, Mount Prospect, Spring-field, Blue Mound, and Bellville. In each exchange two students from CHS participated in a week's activities at one of the schools, while we were host to two of their students. In all cases the exchange of ideas and personalities proved to be a useful, and interesting experiment.





HS Adds New Sponsor, Spring Picnic








Weihnachtsabend -A Big Success

JETS Take Off Into Second Year



Students Tackle Dropout Problem


Realizing a need for stronger ties between the high school and the community, students of CHS took action to curb the difficulty. The result of the action: the Community Relations Club.

A girl collapsing in a heap on the floor isn't really fainting; she's simply practicing her Orchesis routine!



Read and Learn; Look and See



The library workers are required to spend one hour daily before, during, or after school checking books in and out and keeping the library in order.








Halls Echo with Sound of Music



Sportsmanship and Fair Play








Possibly the fastest team in Champaign history, our Maroons displayed a tremendous amount of power and speed enroute to a 7-2 season. Led by the expert coaching of Head Coach Tommy Stewart and Assistants Wes Davis and Charlie Sides, the Maroons had the strongest offense in the league. CHS scored 43 touchdowns in nine games and averaged 32 points per game, while holding their opponents to approximately six points.



With expert coaching, and with Bill Huston leading the way, our Maroons were the top offensive team in the league. Huston shattered all CHS rushing records with 33 touchdowns in his career, 1,261 yards in one season, and 2,485 yards in his career. There were many other outstanding individuals on this team, such as Jeff Trigger, Dave Mehnert, Rod Lewis, Ron Shirley, Renard Danenhower, Tom Crum, and Ron Green, who composed probably the fastest line in the history of Champaign football. Mike Butler was an outstanding end, catching nine passes for 274 vards and six touchdowns.

In the offensive backfield, Joe Lee had a great year, accounting for 707 yards and nine touchdowns, and was third in the league in scoring. Other valuable ball carriers were Glenn Wood and R. E. Goines. The quarterbacking job was capably handled by Chuck Spencer. An excellent ball-handler and a good passer, he completed 17 out of 33 passes for 423 yards and eight touchdowns. Rocky Peacock, only a junior, was the fullback, but he actually played the part of another lineman. Rocky was an excellent blocker and really helped in opening holes for the backs.

Along with its powerful offense, CHS also possessed a tough defense, which gave up an average of only one touchdown per game, while the offense was scoring about five. The Maroons' strong forward wall consisted of Tom Crum, Jim Johnson, Bruce McGlasson, Dave Mehnert, Ron Green, and Rich Patton, who made it difficult for anyone to gain any vardage up the middle and always put a hard rush on all opposing passers. Backing up this wall was a trio of superb linebackers. Spots were Joe Lee, Lynn Peabody, and Glenn Wood. These boys, along with defensive halfbacks Mike Butler and Bill Huston, were in charge of pass defense and stopping all wide plays.










Maroons Get Hot at Semester Break


After Christmas, the Maroons were much im-








CHS tankmen, Gary Tummelson and Jeff Tock dive off the starting blocks during a Big 12 Conference meet.






Kip Pope is shown at the finish of the 100-yard breaststroke in which he eclipsed the state record.



Last summer Dr. E. H. Mellon, Superintendent of Schools for the past 22 years, traveled to Seattle to accept the National Education Association's Pacemaker Award in behalf of the Champaign Unit Four School District. The honor, given to a total of eight school systems across the country which were judged as outstanding in some way, was awarded to Champaign on the basis of the all-around excellence of the program.

Mr. George P. Hankinson came to the school system in 1963. As Assistant Superintendent for Business, he is responsible for gathering information for the annual budget, processing all purchase orders. and is in charge of transportation, maintenance, and cafeteria programs. He has the supervision of all 245 non-academic staff members as well as the payroll of all employees. 



Handling Office, **Business Duties**





The new library at the Annex provides new features of individual study booths and recording equipment in addition to having a suite of rooms used for reading, working, and lecturing.






Counseling Office Provides Brochures






Science, Math Departments Offer

Advanced Courses


Elementary students are being introduced to the principles of physics through talks and demonstrations given by several advanced physics students to fourth and fifth classes. Advanced courses are offered in the three fields of biology, chemistry, and physics. A new approach is being used to teach beginning biology, called the Biology Science Curriculum Study, which uses the discovery method to encourage students to gather information and draw conclusions through lab exercises. Although science courses are not required at CHS, enrollment in them keeps pace with school expansion, as is indicated by the 17 classes offered in chemistry, nine in biology, and five in physics.


Bill Jarmen and Carolyn Wood gather data for a graph plotting the relationship of an object and its image in a curved mirror.





Language labs and class recitation are becoming the focal point as foreign language classes study through the oral-aural method. In this program emphasis is placed on conversation and comprehension of the spoken word. One exception is the experimental program at the Annex in first- and second-year Spanish using a visual-audio program. Modern language classes make use of the recording facilities for aid in easier correction of their pronunciation difficulties.

The new language laboratory at the Annex is the newest and best-equipped in the school system. Each student booth has a tape recorder plus regular equipment for more efficiency in lab work. When the lab is completely finished, taped programs can be sent from a center on first floor to the second floor lab, regular classrooms, and small study carrels between classrooms.

Musical, Tour, **Candy, and Song**






