
CURIOUS NOISES AND CHOKING GASES






Shop and Home Economics








General Chairmen for this Seventh Annual Homecoming Parade were Jim Booth, Bonnie Adams, and Chuck Middleton.



Juniors Worked Hard on '63 Prom







The prospector (Laird Salisbury) points accusingly at the Madwoman of Chaillot (Nancy Ross) as the horrified cafe frequenters watch.








AFS Promotes Global Good Neighbor Policy

AS IN THE PAST several years, American Field Service was again an important part of the school year. The most noticeable signs of AFS activity were Nancy Booth, Asmeron Kidane, and chocolate. The main objectives of the AFS committee were to bring a foreign student to Urbana and to send a U.H.S., junior to a foreign country.

In order to accomplish these goals, the committee, under the faculty guidance of Miss Marie Bauer and Mr. Taylor Thomas, had to raise \$1300. Once again, AFS chose to sell chocolate as their main money-raising project. U.H.S.'ers didn't eat turkey for Thanksgiving: they munched AFS chocolate. In all, the chocolate sale netted over \$1100. The committee also sold World Friendship Shares in an effort to promote interest in AFS. The committee had to screen juniors to find the four best-qualified juniors to go abroad this summer; they also screened families to find housing for the foreign student who will live in Urbana next year. The New York office made all final decisions concerning both phases of the program.





Student Council co-sponsored the winter semi-form dance in January. It also presented the Vice Versa Dan in March.








The first meeting of the Library Club was a picnic at Stal Lake Park. There were games and plenty of food everyone.




Championship








Myers attempts to prove that he can score without glasses in Champaign victory.










