in our hearts.

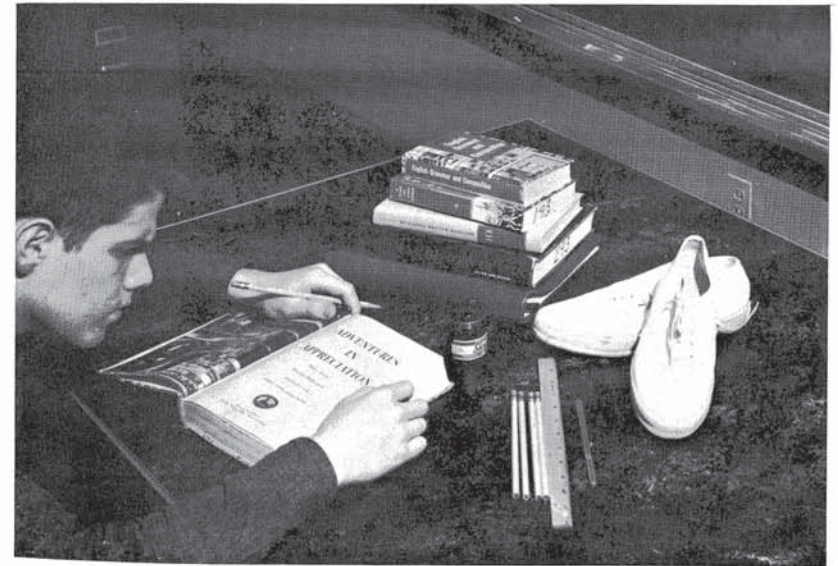

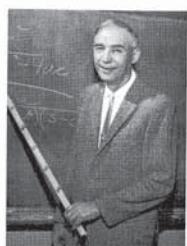

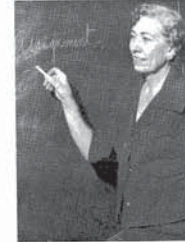
