




The brother-sister program which helped students get acquainted with Marion Joseph was also sponsored by the AFS Committee under the guidance of Miss Bauer.





Energetic students with interest in Urbana-High dramatic productions formed the club of Delta Sigma and Thespians. 


Of Concert Band's Musical Activities
