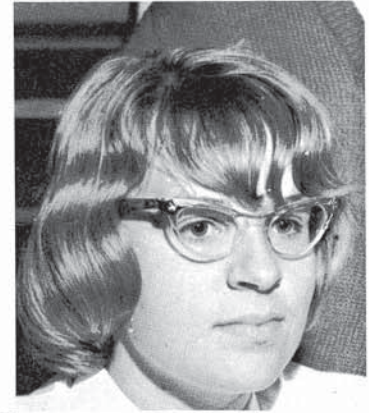

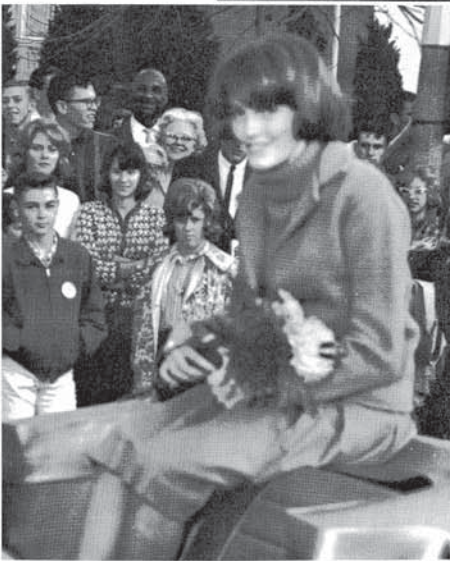
Homecoming Could Never Be More Perfect

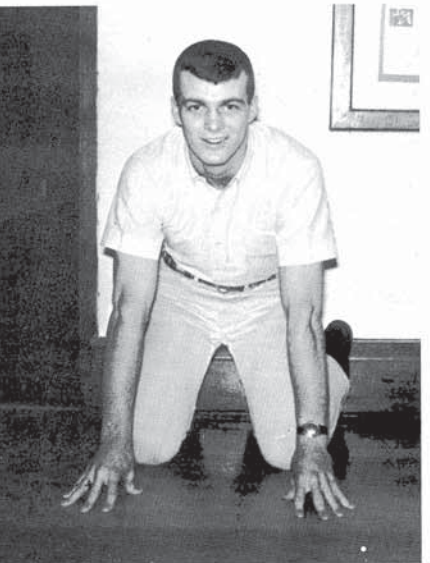
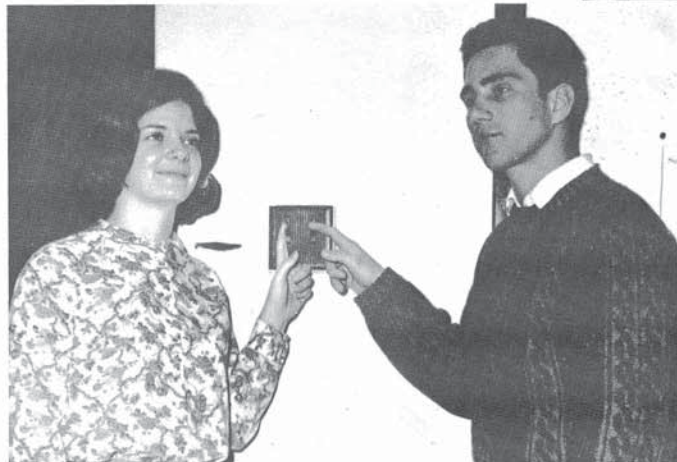
