


In only four short years Urbana High School has seen its soccer team establish itself as a dominate threat and has gained the reputation as being one of the best teams in the area. This




An undersized Varsity football team experienced a tough season this year. After a rousing season opener win, the Tigers struggled through eight more games which all ended in defeat.


pool, was that there were no diving boards and because no one could practice diving, they were always at a disadvantage at swim meets.



















### A Class With Class

Led by their fearless sponsors, Ms. Dunn and Ms. Kron, these brave souls, along with a few others, embarked on a fundraising campaign second to none.


Starting with their sophomore year, the class has staged fundraisers including sales of candy, balloons and boxer shorts, as well as ushering at several Illini men's basketball games.

The level of stress created by tests such as these is comparable to that which is experienced by a mouse trying to solve Algebra problems while having rubberbands shot at him




"The way I see it," said Lauren Douglas, "we juniors are one step above utter immaturity yet one step away from ultimate superiority."

### A Year of Firsts





This was also the first year that freshmen had participated in the whirl of Homecoming activities.


"It was a really busy week, but it was so much fun. I can't wait till next year," said one stimulated freshman abut Homecoming week.






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#### The Year in Review

#### August

The continued decline of Communism affected Poland this month. With the political shrewdness of Lech Walesa, a new government was formed which peacefully pushed Communism aside. In the United States, we chuckled at the stubbornness of Zsa Zsa Gabor after she was incarcerated for slapping a police officer. Janet Jackson debuted her new al-

> bum "Rhythm Nation 1814." On August 23 UHS students walked the renovated halls of the new school for the first time as school began its first day.



The United States shook along with the rest of the world in October as we watched the horror of the '89 earthquake in California. The earthquake which struck the Hayward Fault on October 17, 1989 just across the San Francisco Bay caused an excess of detrimental damage. An estimate of 400 people were killed along with thousands of others who received injury. Another major "quake" occurred in the U.S. due to the start of the Rolling Stones American Tour. The English group rocked the U.S. from coast to coast selling out show after

#### October

January January 1, 1990, the start of not only a new year, but a new decade in which all sorts of exciting events occurred. President Bush ordered an invasion of Panama in order to arrest their leader and drug lord, Manuel Noriega. After several days of hiding, Noriega gave himself up to U.S. forces. There was also some exciting times in sports during January. Joe Montana led the San Francisco 49ers to their second consecutive Super Bowl championship. There was a mild winter for UHS students this year except for a few days in January when winter reared its ugly head and the temperatures fell twenty degrees below zero. The students of UHS experienced several sleepless nights trying to cram a semesters worth of work into 15 hours of studying for the infamous Finals.

#### September

South Africa elected their new President, F.W. deKlerk. Due to his obvious disregard to attempt any black-white negotiations, violence broke out which marked one of the bloodiest battles in South Africa since 1985. In the occupied West Bank, Yasir Arafat got fed up with what he considered a lack of concern by the U.S. for the PLO's movement. The U.S. had discontinued peace talks between the Palestines and Isrod, and many PLO members feared what no negotiations would come about. President Bush waged his war on drugs this month by nationally broadcasting a speech where he asked the entire nation to get behind him and help stop this serious problem. Jim Bakker's trial closed the chapter on his charade when he was found guilty on 24 counts of fraud and conspiracy.

#### November

The walls came tumbling down in November, literally. The Berlin Wall, which was erected in 1961, came down at the hands of its people. After more than 28 years the city was reunited as one, and the people were free to walk the streets of East and West Berlin without fear. What was only a dream became a long awaited reality. Continued fighting in El Salvador claimed the lives of 6 Jesuit priests and hundreds of other citizens that were stalked down by the infamous death squads. The great piano player Vladimir Horowitz at age 86 died this month. He was considered the last great romantic for he captured a genuine 19th and 20th century sound. Paul McCartney's solo tour hit the states, and as always was a show to please. Once again the annual Student Senate Thanksgiving Dinner was a success serving over 500 people on Thanksgiving Day.

#### December

Just a month after the Berlin Wall came down and the government's reign over its people, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, and Bulgaria followed this pattern. The once powerful government control in these countries crumbled, and the people were free from fear. Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev and President Bush met at the Malta Summit this month with ideas of loosening the socialist world in the Soviet Union and sketching an arms-control plan for both countries to follow. Leona Helmsley, "the Queen of Mean," received her sentence for tax evasion in December that added up to \$7.1 million in fines, 750 hours of community service, and 4 years in jail.

#### February

After 27 years of imprisonment in South Africa, Nelson Mandela the renowned political prisoner was released from his confinement. The ice storm of 1990 struck the Champaign-Urbana area severely in February. For nearly 5 days 15000 local residents were without power which wiped out all local schools for 3 days. Many trees in the area took an extreme beating from the ice which caused much of the local damage and took several weeks to clean up. UHS hosted the annual midwinter conference in its newly remodeled school and also celebrated Black History Month with several assemblies sponsored by MIA.






#### My Side of the Railroad Tracks
