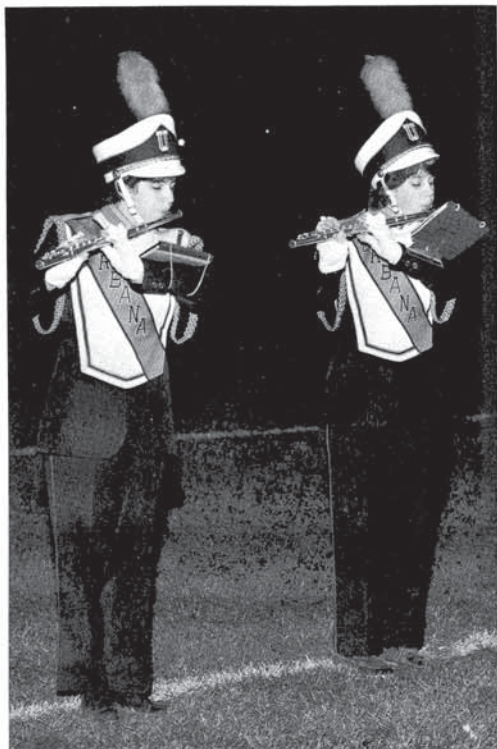

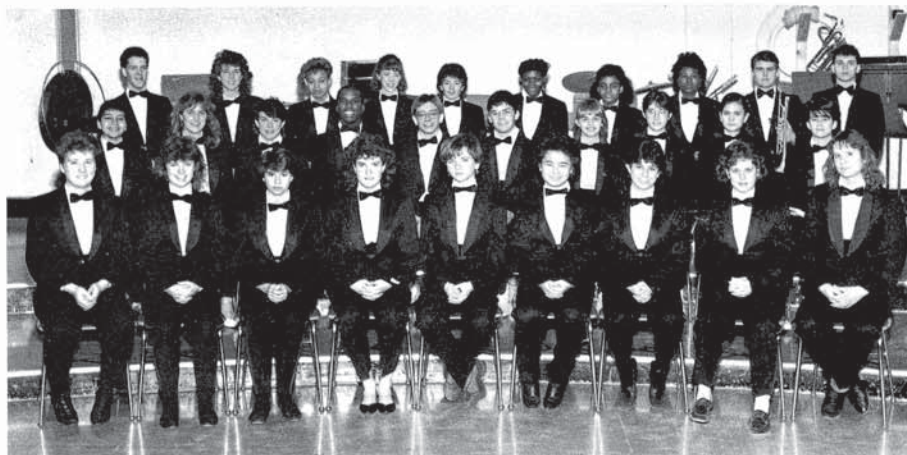

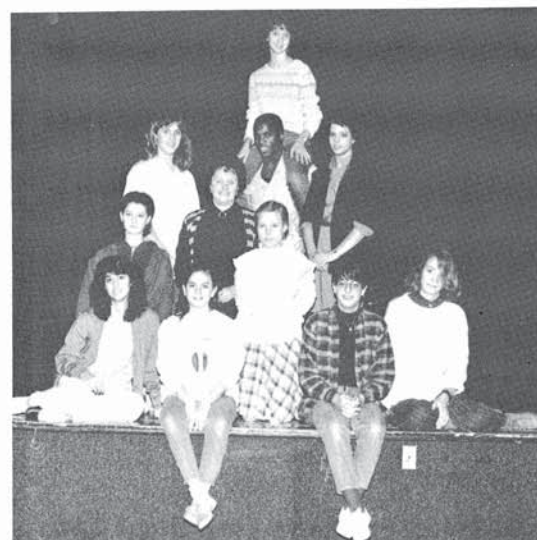

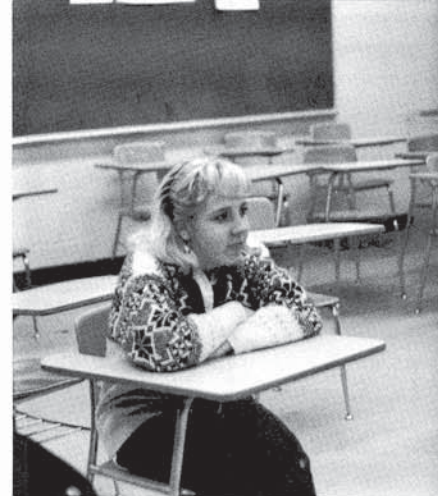


Excelling Students

Don't Drive Drunk

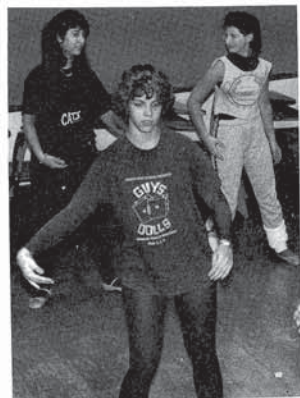

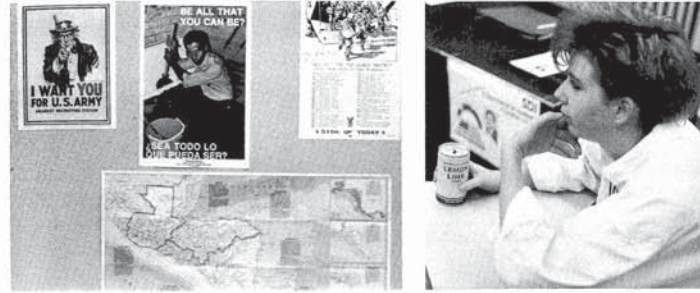

Looking Beyond Grade Twelve

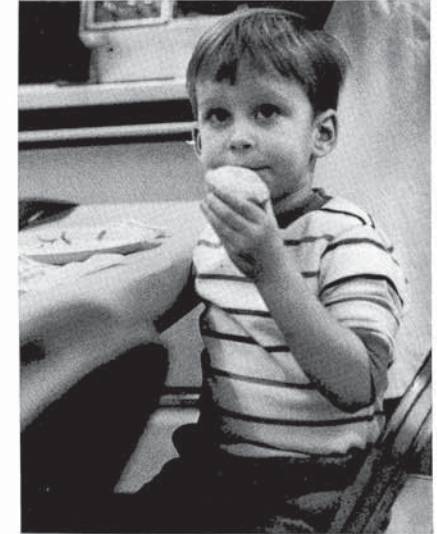
