

Warren "Smitty" Smith

This book has not been dedicated to anyone for many years because dedications went out of style for yearbooks some time ago. Dedication, however, did not go out of style for coach and teacher Warren Smith, known by students, colleagues, parents and community as Smitty. Smitty died on November 24, 1984 after suffering a massive heart attack while attending the State Football Championships which he was instrumental in planning. His gifts to Urbana High School and its students were great. He coached football with unmatched energies for twenty-nine years. His 1957, '59, '62, '64 and '65 teams won Big 12 Conference titles. Under his coaching, the Tigers built an impressive 142-86-8 record. He was inducted into the Illinois High School Coaches Hall of Fame in 1981 and invented a practice machine called the blaster. His energies were not limited to the football field as he helped players get scholarships and followed their progress with pride long after they played for him. Smitty's dedication to his players, his sport and this school prompts the Rosemary staff to dedicate this book to him. Rosemary is for remembrance.
