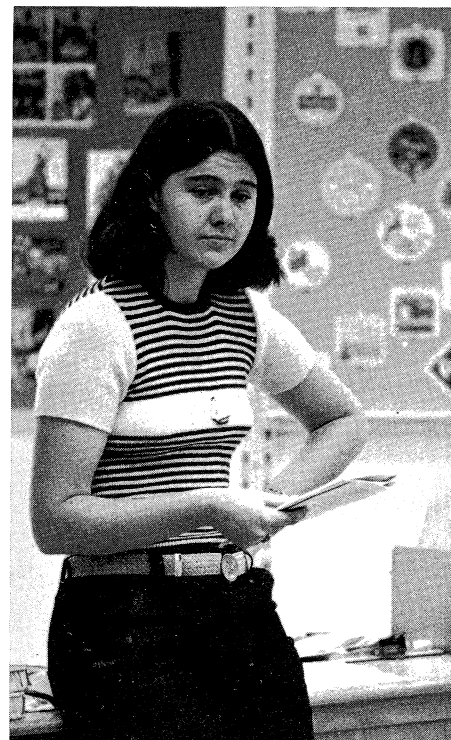


CULTURE, ART DISCUSSED IN FOREIGN LANGUAGE DEPARTMENT

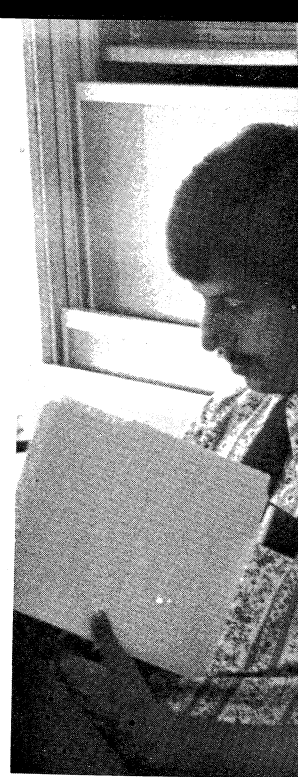

STUDENTS PROBE FRONTIERS

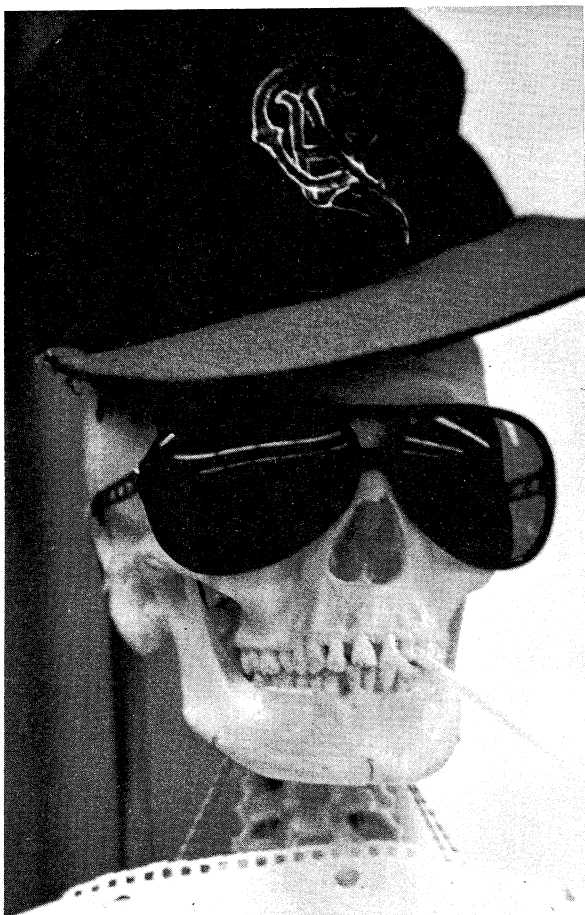

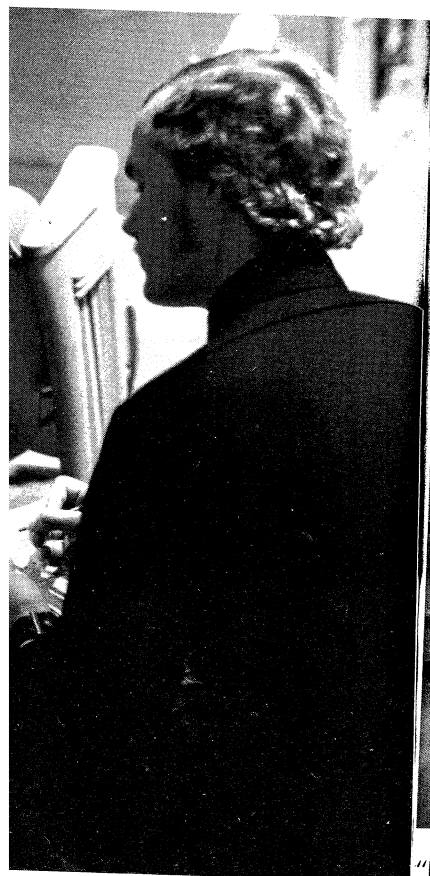

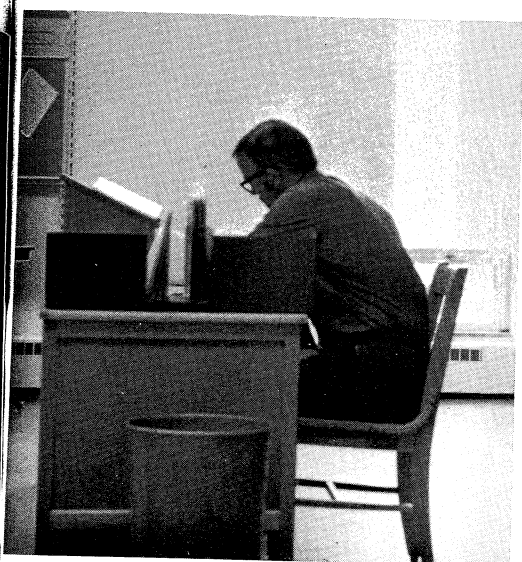

NEW MATH POSES PROBLEMS

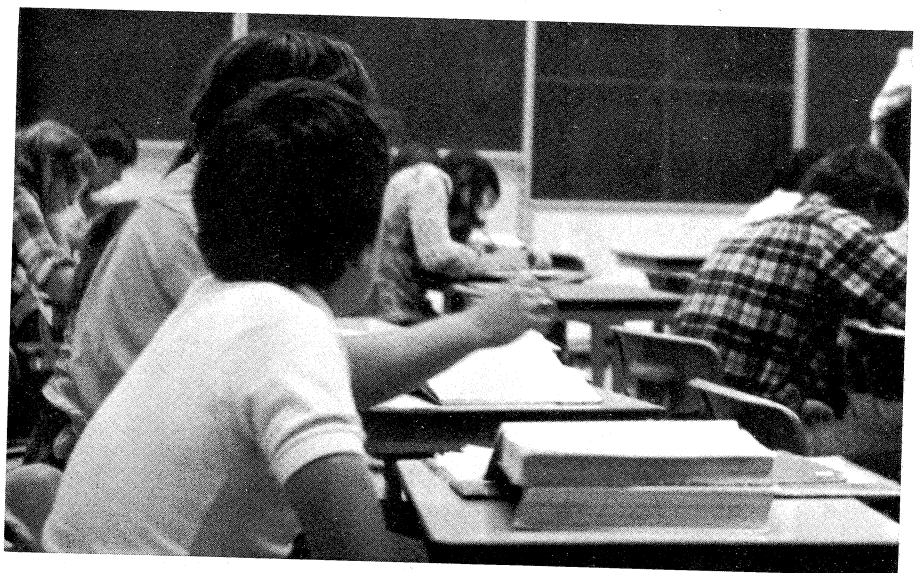

SOCIAL STUDIES CHALLENGES CITIZENS

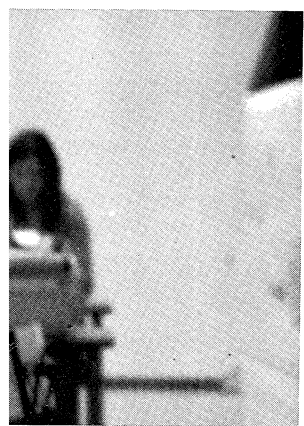

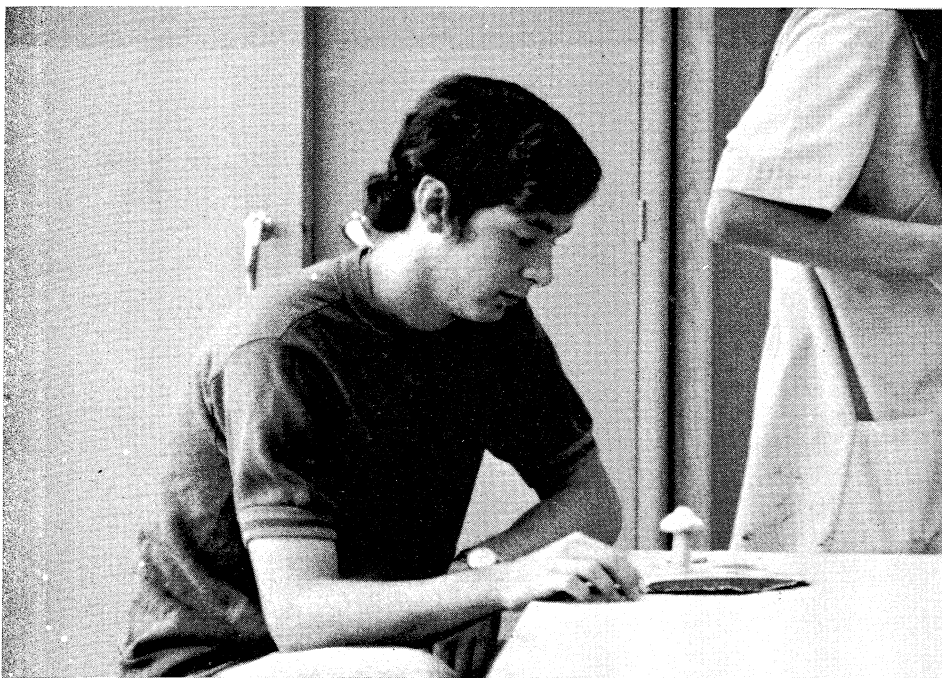
EXPRESSION THROUGH ART

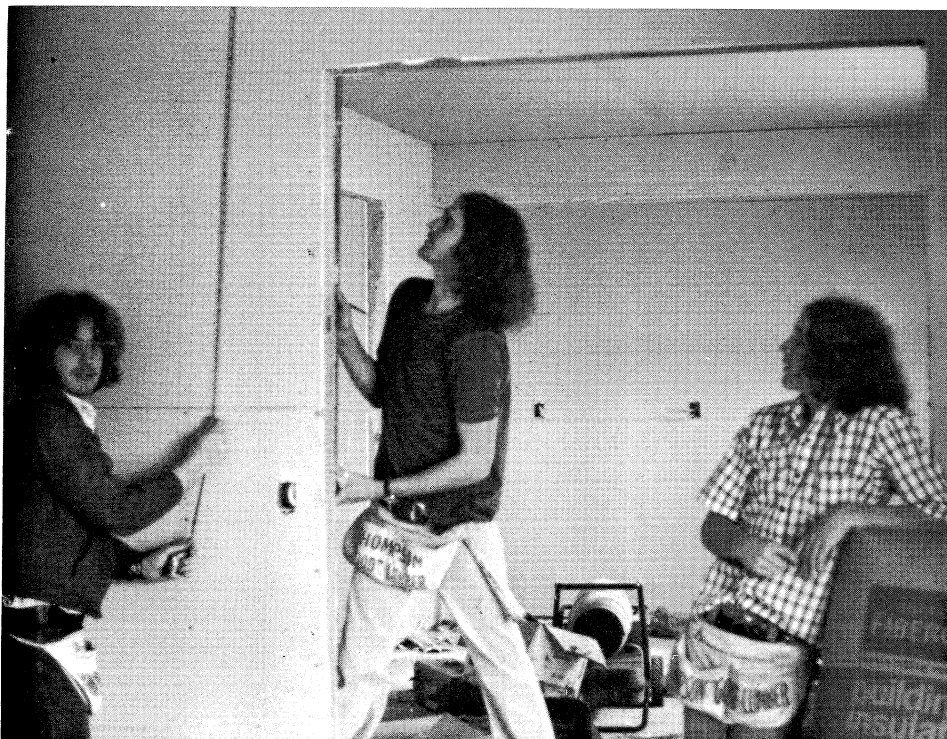

OFFICE HELP INDISPENSABLE

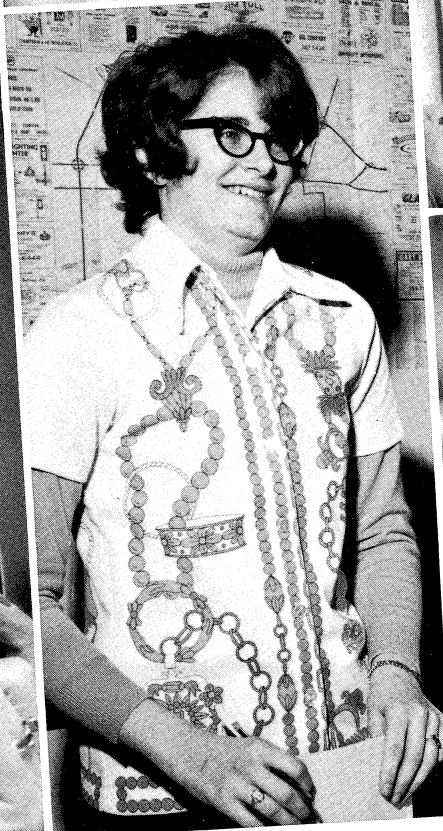

UNIT 4 BOARD GUIDES THROUGH INTEREST

The Board of Education is an elected group of seven men and women who are legally responsible for the formulation of policy to guide the total operation of the Champaign Public Schools. Serving without any salary, the Board meets the second Monday of every month with a frequent study session later in the month.

During the past year *School Management* magazine, a national publication, conducted a survey which indicated that Unit 4 is ranked in the top quarter of the schools in the expenditure effort. The survey also indicated that the district directs 82% of its money to instructional purposes compared to the national average of 72%.

The Centennial Student Advisory Council is a committee of students who represent their respective classes at bi-monthly meetings of the Board and area SAC's. These representatives present and discuss various topics of interest with the Board, hoping to share the students' view in present policies and procedures of Unit 4.



Dr. Marshall K. Berner, Superintendent of Schools, is responsible for carrying out Board of Education policy and for providing leadership for the total educational operation of the district.



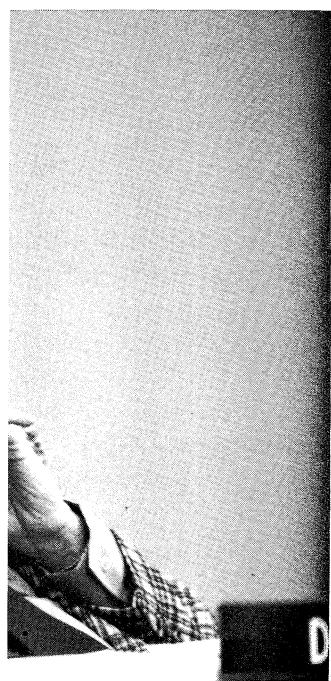

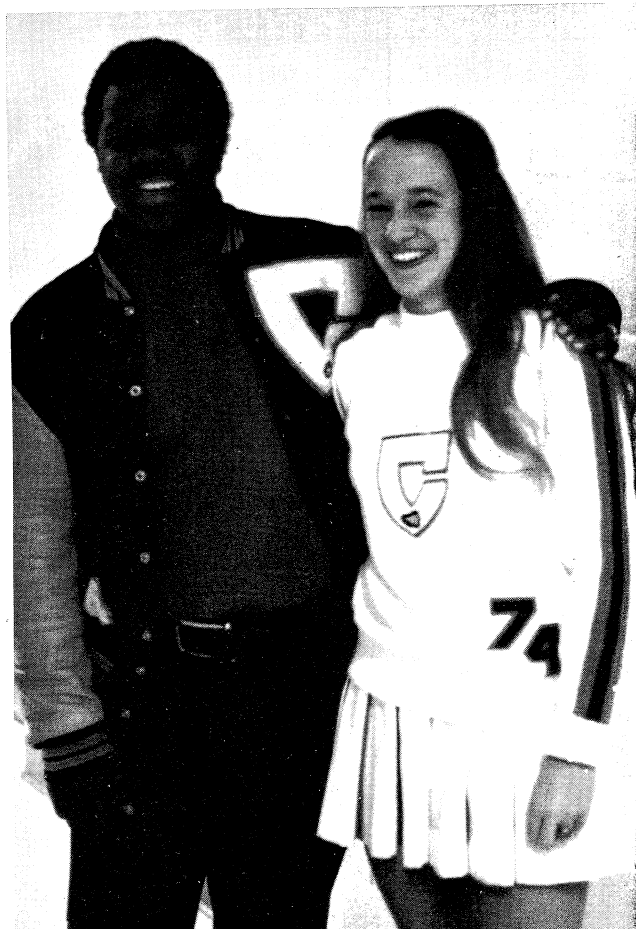

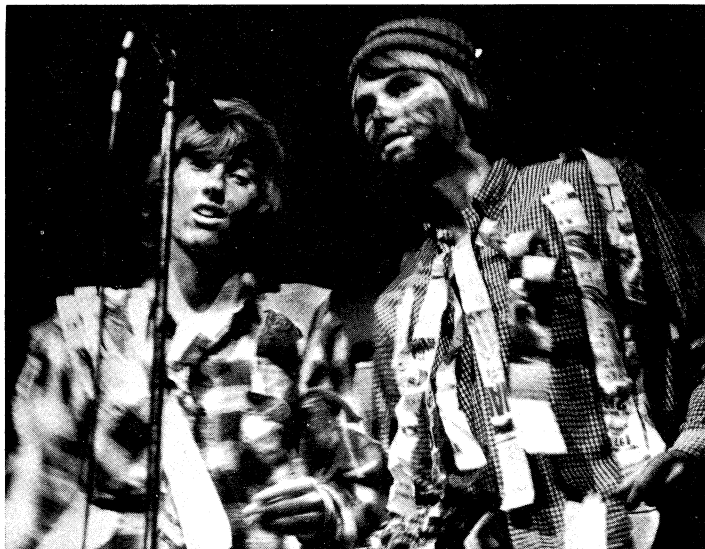

In the pattern He has planned.*

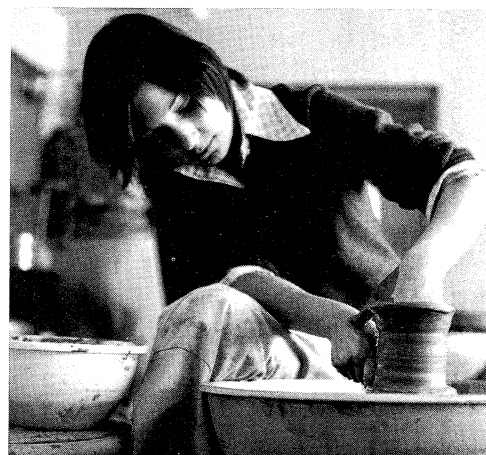
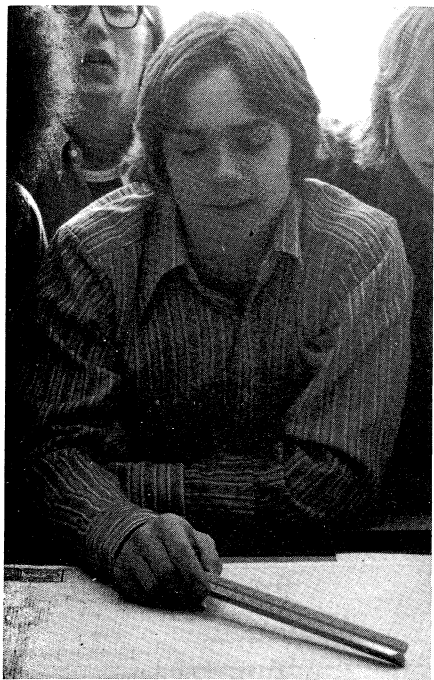
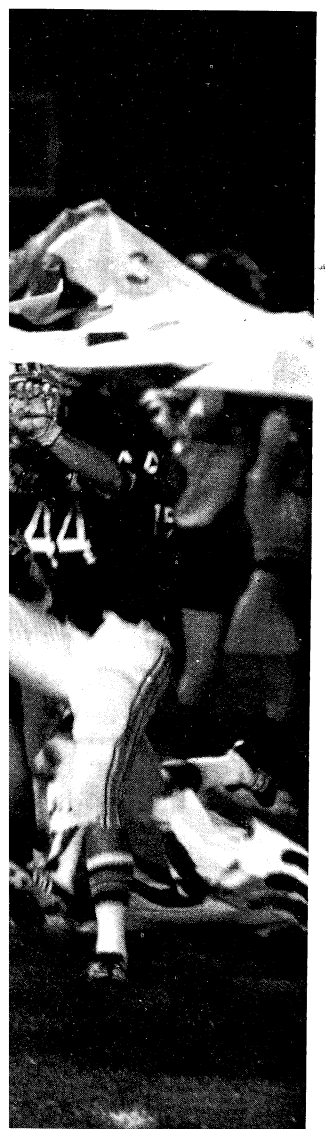

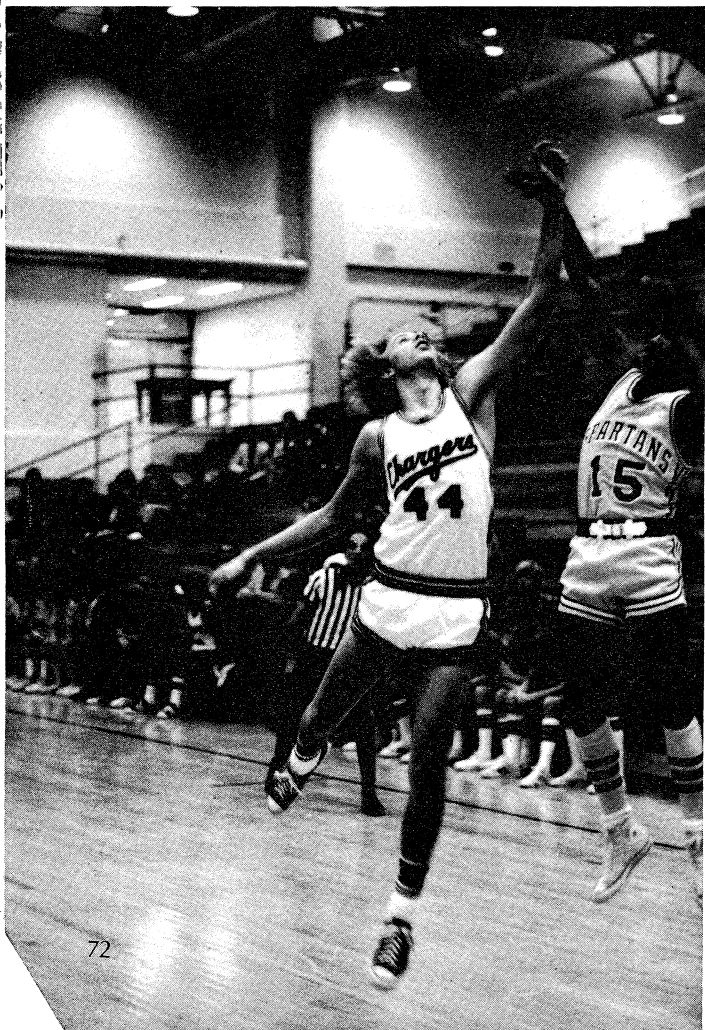


SOPHOMORES SPARKLE THROUGH IMPROVEMENT

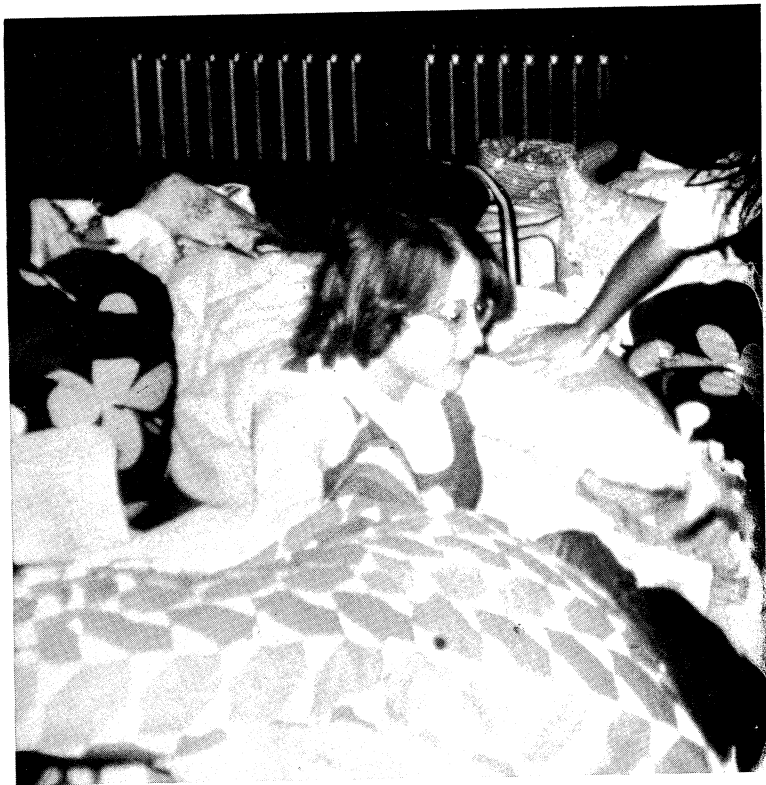

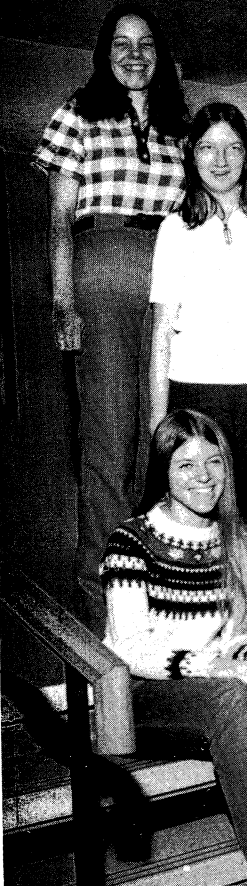
