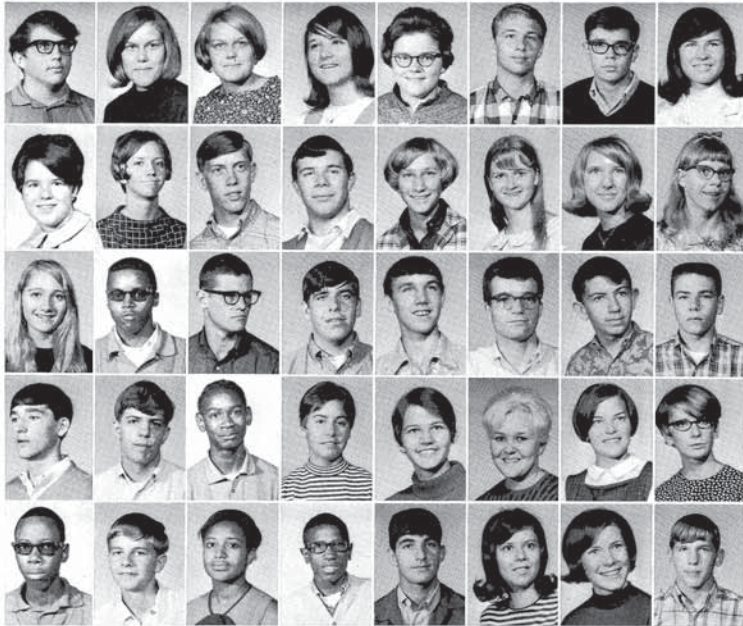

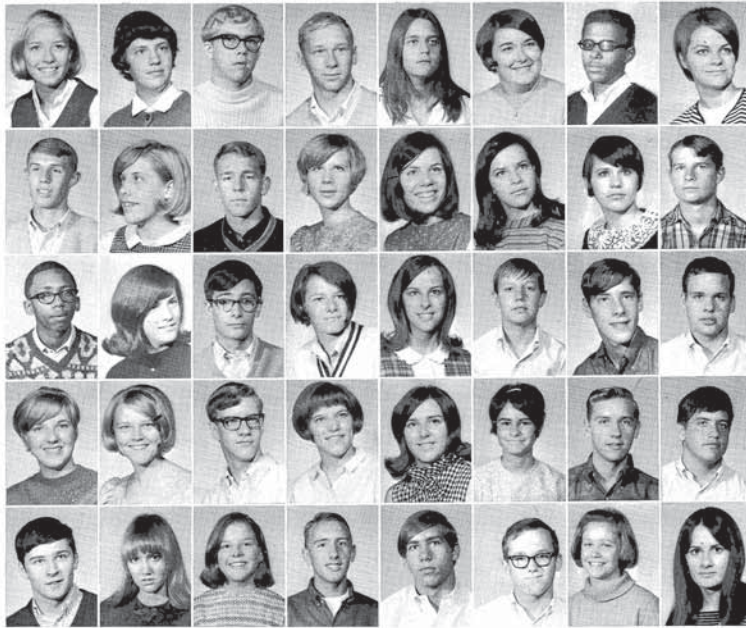

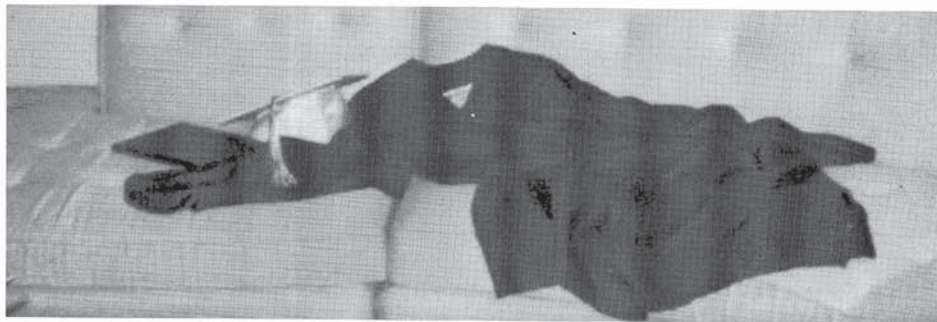

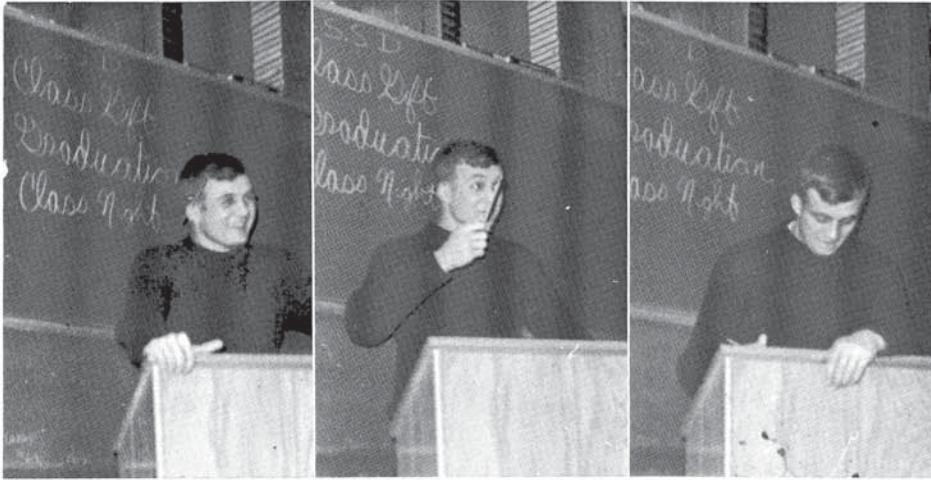

only Seniors can know.

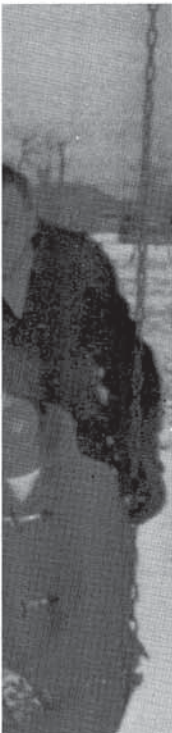
The slow days passed quickly,

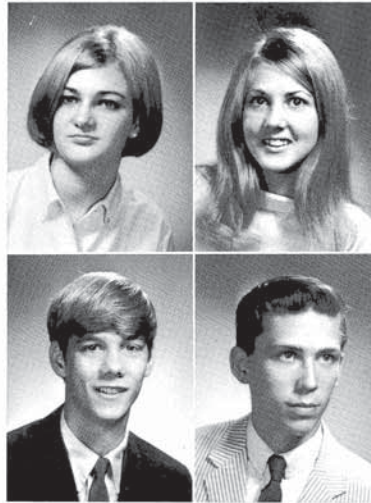

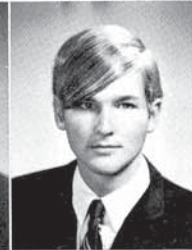
