A variety of people ran for class offices this year, and the speeches were as varied, from the recital of a long, rambling, funny poem to more serious talks about issues and problems here at school.



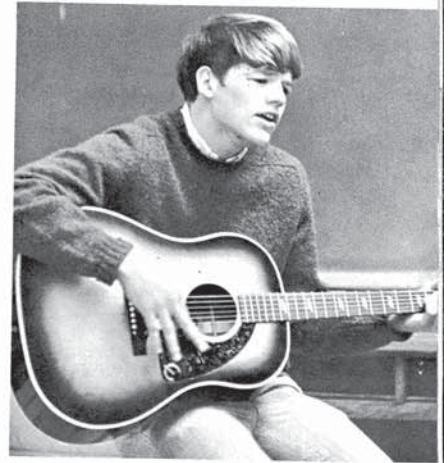

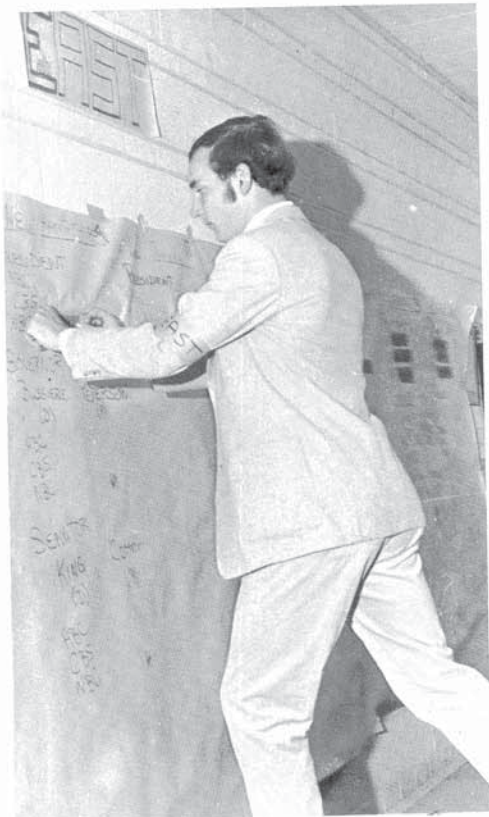




Election Night

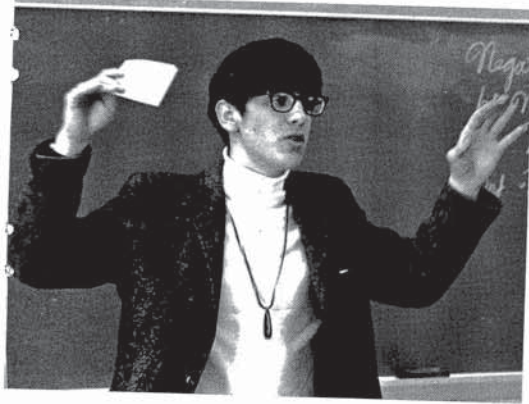
Suspense

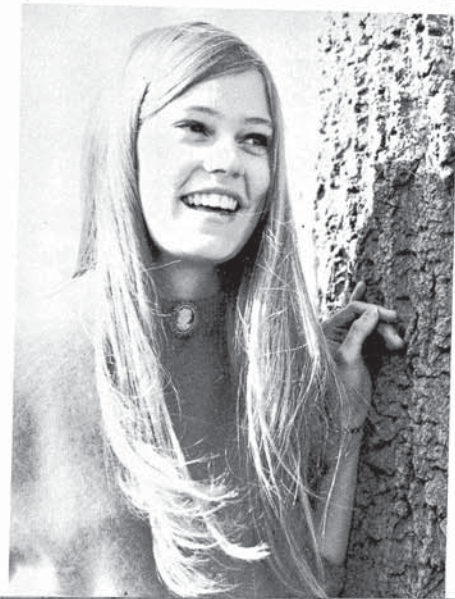

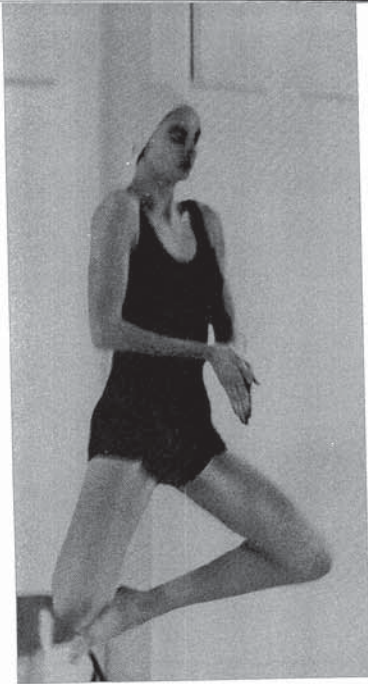

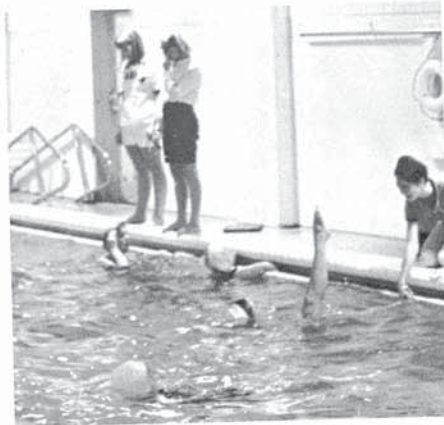
