Almost Great

The Urbana swimming team developed into one of the midstate powers in '69. Their record was a mediocre 5-5 but they rose to the occasion in the district and conference meets, finishing third and second respectively. It was a tremendously successful year from the standpoint of individual performances, as five new records were established and three men plus a relay qualified for state competition. Leon Yankwich qualified in the 50 freestyle and set a new district mark of 22.7. He also set a school record of 57.0 in the 100 freestyle and won two conference crowns. Ted Odom glosed out his high school career in freestyle as he qualified for state on the strength of his district diving win. He also set the conference diving mark. Andy Miller was indispensable in winning two firsts in conference and district, setting a 400 freestyle record of 4:07, and qualifying for the state meet. The 400 yard freestyle relay team of Creighton Laz, Jim Glasa, Jim Weisiger, and Leon Yankwich also qualified for state as they broke the school record in 3:33.5. Another record, the 160 medley relay, was tied in 1:24.5 by Jim Weisiger, Chris Brown, Creighton Laz, and Leon Yankwich.





State qualifying relay team of Leon Yankwich, Jim Glasa, and Creighton Laz. (4th man, Jim Weisiger, not present).





Harrier Depth Proves Potent

With the help of three exceptional Sophomores and six returning lettermen, Bill Plymire's '68 Tiger Harriers compiled a fine 10-4 dual meet record and finished third in both the conference and district meets. Among these four losses, two came against a powerful Danville team and the other two were suffered to teams which the Tigers beat convincingly in later invitationals. To their dual meet record, the varsity added a first at the Paris invitational, and the Sophomores were undefeated in dual meets, first at both Paris and Centennial. Despite an injury to Captain Larry Abernathy and sickness of other top runners, some good individual performances and substantial depth proved potent against most opponents. Junior Gary "the Machine" Shaw and Senior John Sherrod led the Tigers to their ten victories and both qualified for the state meet at Savoy. A severe blow to the team was a knee injury to Captain Larry Abernathy, which put him out for the season. These two were supported by Sophomore Marc Chandler, Seniors Bob Werkman, Roy Roberts, Rich Cureton, Mike Giddens, and Jim Kruidenier and Sophomores Greg Shaw and Bill Judd.




