





Shriner's spokesman said. Another conventioneer, Walter B. Taylor, Sr., of Ramese Temple No., 51 in Charlotte, N.C., said he joined the Ma-sons 41 years ago as a way to combat discrimination against African Americans. Today, in the age of integration, he would not like to see all Shriners under one banner. "It would be like the big fish swallowing the little fish," he said. Founded on July 3, 1776, by Prince Hall, a free African-American soldier who fought in the Revolutionary War, later black Shriners once fought off a 20th Century attack by Caucasian Shriners of the Masonic Order who did not want them to use the Shriner name or traditions. It took a U.S. Supreme Court decision on June 23, 1929, to confirm the Prince Hall Masons and Shriners the right to the name and traditions. The editors of Ebony magazine recently

listed the "100 Most Influential Blacks In America," one-fourth of whom are Prince Hall Shriners. Prince Hall Shriners of note include St. Louis Mayor Freeman R. 
Dixon Elected To Elks Post

Legion's Scott commands attent

One of growing number of women in leader roles By SCOTT KOENEMAN News-Gazette Staff Writer CHAMPAIGN — Anna Wall

Scott isn't the first woman ever elected to the position of American Legion post commander. She is, though, one of a growing number of women who are getting involved in Legion leadership.

It's an involvement that now stretches from the post level all the way to the state level.

The one position they haven't held is state commander, said Vincent Sanzotta, adjutant of the Department of Illinois American Legion, the organization that oversees all the state's posts.

"I've been with the department for 38 years and in that time, we've had maybe 25 or 30 women (in leadership positions) at the district, division and de-partment level," he said.

The American Legion in Illinois is divided at several levels, with the post level the lowest, department the highest and district and division in between.

Scott was elected commander of William F. Ernest Post 559 on June 4.

She said she believes she is the first woman to be elected

commander in this area.

"Years ago, I served as second vice president, but then I lost interest," she said. "Then, a couple years ago, I was appointed adjutant and started getting active."

Scott served in the Women's Army Corps during World War II. She was trained as a clerk at Fort Des Moines in Des Moines.

Iowa. "At that time, we were segre-

gated," said Scott, who is black. The membership of Post 559 is also primarily black.

"It wasn't that difficult to make the transition because we had been segregated in high school," she said.

As is the case with many vet-

erans, Scott said her military experience helped her mature. "I remember I grew up pretty

quickly," she said.

She said it was her patriotism that drew her to the Army and. after her discharge, to the Legion.

Now an instructor at Parkland College, Scott said she did not find the transition to leadership in the male-dominated organization difficult either.

"They elected me commander. They all know me," she said.

Scott has had a number of firsts, including being the first woman elected to the state Democratic Party Central Committee. But she said she finds her election as post commander particularly satisfying.


Sanzotta said the Legion has always been open to women, as long as they served during a time of war, the only requirement for entry.

As women have taken a larger role in the military, through Korea, Vietnam and Operation Desert Storm, their numbers in the Legion have grown, he said.

"We're starting to see more of them coming into leadership roles. They know they have been accepted and are willing to serve," he said. "And they have done an excellent job in those positions. I think we need this. I think we want them and the leadership they can provide.'

Dusted by coal tar, Legionnaires like new site

Driven from their old home when it was found to sit on contaminated soil, members of American Legion Post 559 in Champaign are now enjoying a new building.

Hickory St. opened about a month ago.

"Everybody's just tickled to death about it," said Jan Menefee, vice president of the post's other posts have been over and Board of Governors.

An underground steel-lined brick "gas holder" at the site contains an estimated 4 to 7 feet of tar. The substance is a byproduct of the coal gasification that took place at the plant between the late 1890s and 1950s.

Coal tar has been found from just below the surface to nearly 40 feet deep at the site and from 10 to 40 feet north of it.

The tar may contain chemicals that cause cancer. But IP and state officials have said the material presents no health hazard in its current state.

IP began taking more soil samples and installing ground-water monitoring wells last year.

IP spokesman Mike Monahan said today that further testing closer to the building will take place next winter.


THE NEXT ROUND of samples will include monitoring of vapors, which are more volatile in warm weather, he said.

"They want to do that when the weather is cold so you can confine those vapors," he said.

IP hopes to complete its hydrogeologic investigation by the end of 1992. The company and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency will then analyze the data and decide whether and when the material should be removed, he said.

IP plans to send out a fact sheet to city officials and nearby residents in the next month or two detailing its plans, he said.

Also, she has published *Free Frank: A Black Pioneer on the Antebellum Frontier* (Lexington: University Press of Kentucky, 1983; paperback ed., 1994), and *War, Peace, and Structural Violence: Peace Activism and the African-American Experience* (Bloomington: Indiana University Center on Global Change and World Peace, 1992), and more than forty articles, essays and reviews.

She has won awards for her publications and teaching. She was the 1989 Ralph Metcalfe Professor at Marquette University and the 1990 Georgia Interdepartmental Universities History Program Visiting Distinguished Scholar.

Her fellowships include a Berkshire, Rockefeller, National Endownment for the Humanities and Fulbright in South Africa, where she taught at the University of Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Africa in 1995.

She has also lectured and participated in conferences in Ghana, Senegal, Hong Kong, and Australia.

Professor Walker's scholarship in African American business expands into Black Intellectual history in her new work, *Captive Capitalist: Black Business, Entrepreneurhip and the Underclass in American*.

Professor Walker area of research is African American business history. Her work is seminal in its focus, since African American history as traditionally interpreted has been limited to studies of plantation slavery and blacks as agricultural workers in addition to the political activities and cultural life of blacks.

What Walker's research shows that there has been a historic tradition of self-help in the economic lives of Black Americans.

BRIEF HISTORY OF DEBORAH CHAPTER NO. 27, O.E.S.

Deborah Chapter #27 received its Charter on October 15, 1897 with Sister Lula Lee the Worthy Matron and Brother Albert Lee the Worthy Patron. The enthusiasm with which they sought this endeavor was of great inspiration to family, members and others. The meetings were held on Taylor Street and Walnut in Champaign, in office space rented by Lone Star Lodge #18 until 1947. The Chapter, after giving many fund raising efforts was able to assist Lone Star Lodge in making the down payment to purchase the Masonic Hall at 208 N. First Street in Champaign, where we now meet. The Chapter has continued to grow.

Brother Albert Lee also served as Worthy Grand Patron of Eureka Grand Chapter in the early 1930's. Since then, several members of Deborah Chapter have held appointed and elected office in the Grand Chapter and Grand Lodge.
