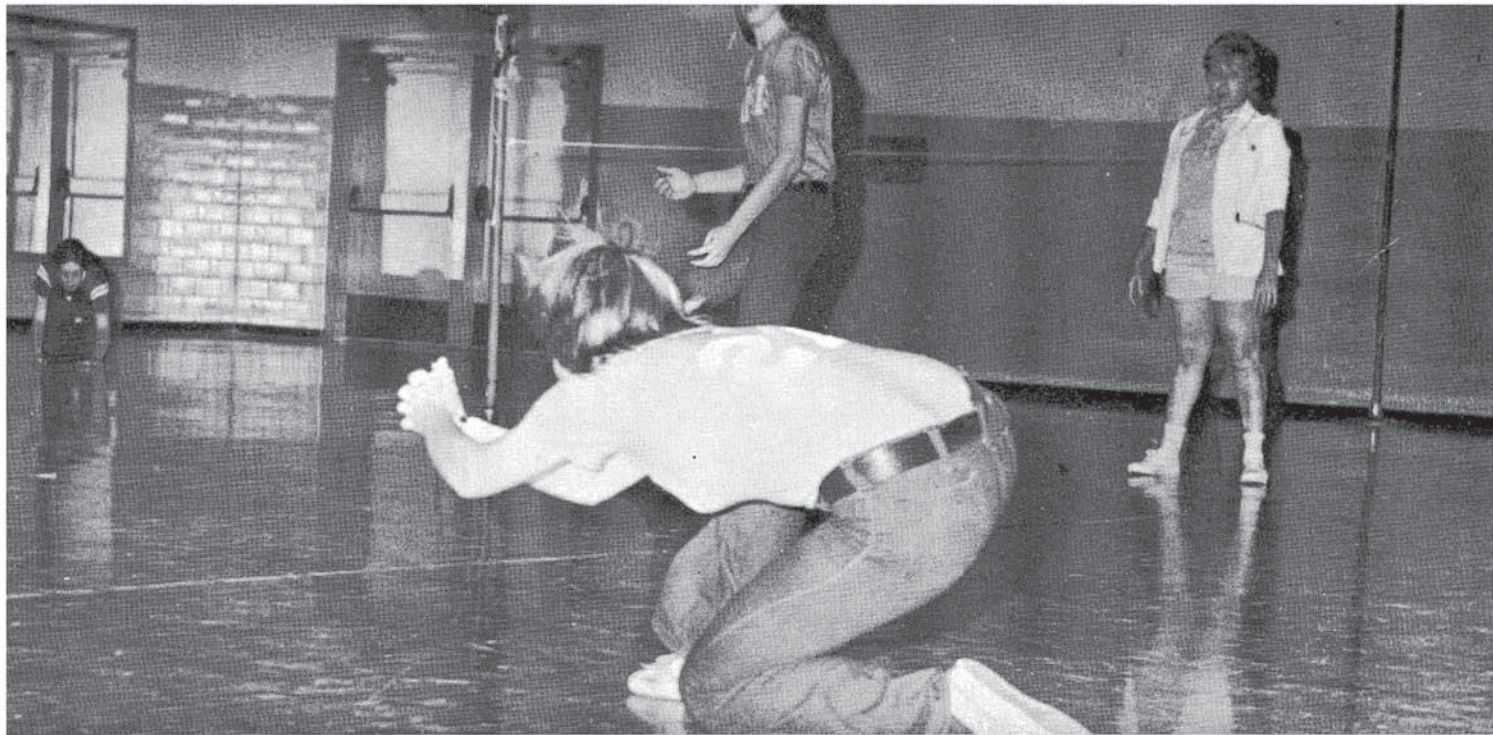

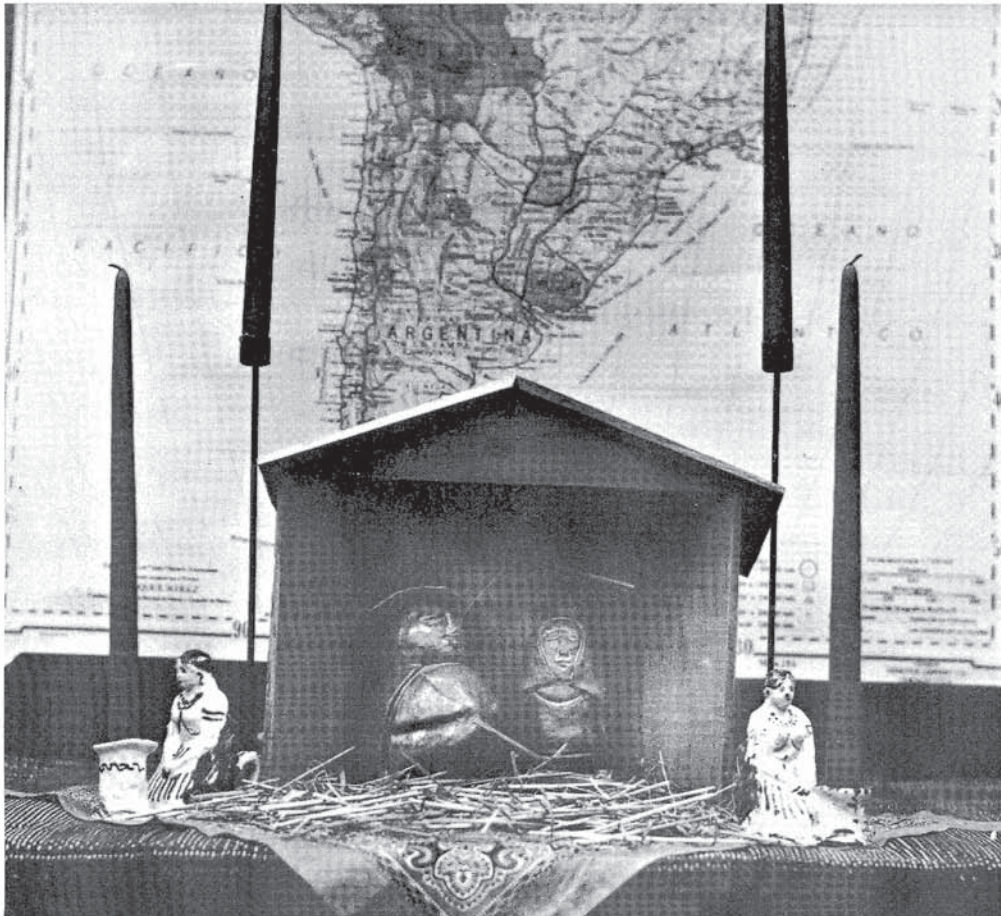
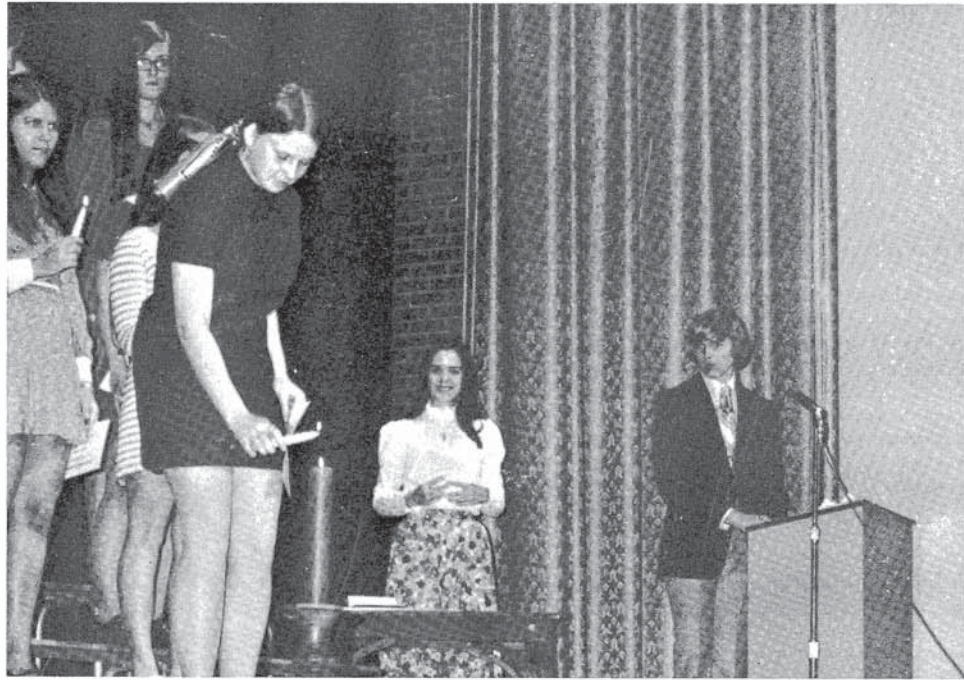

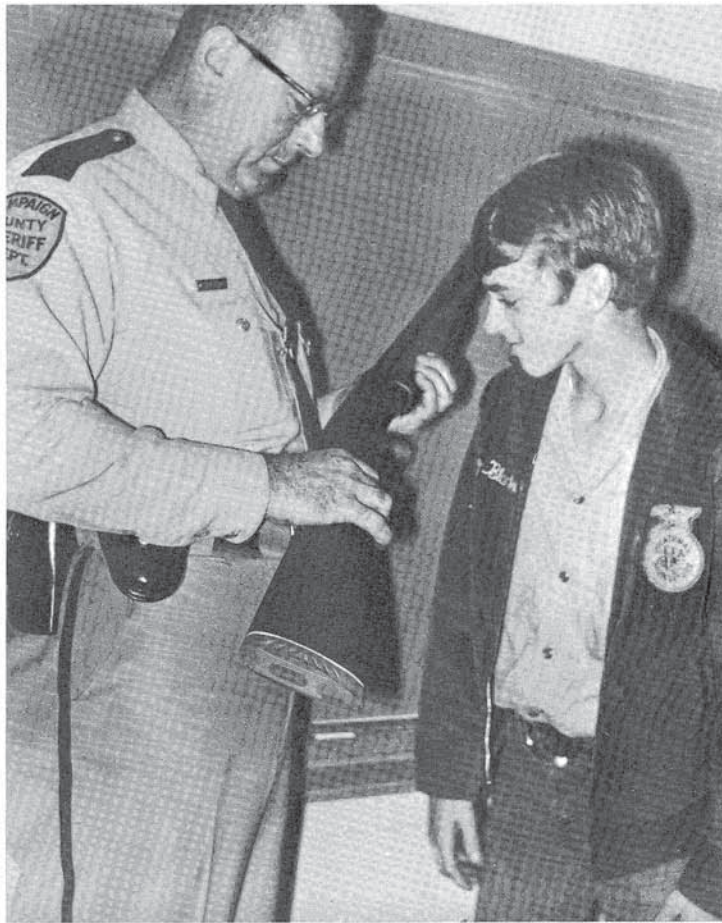
## Local FFA Chapter Attends Convention in Missouri, Wins National FFA Award

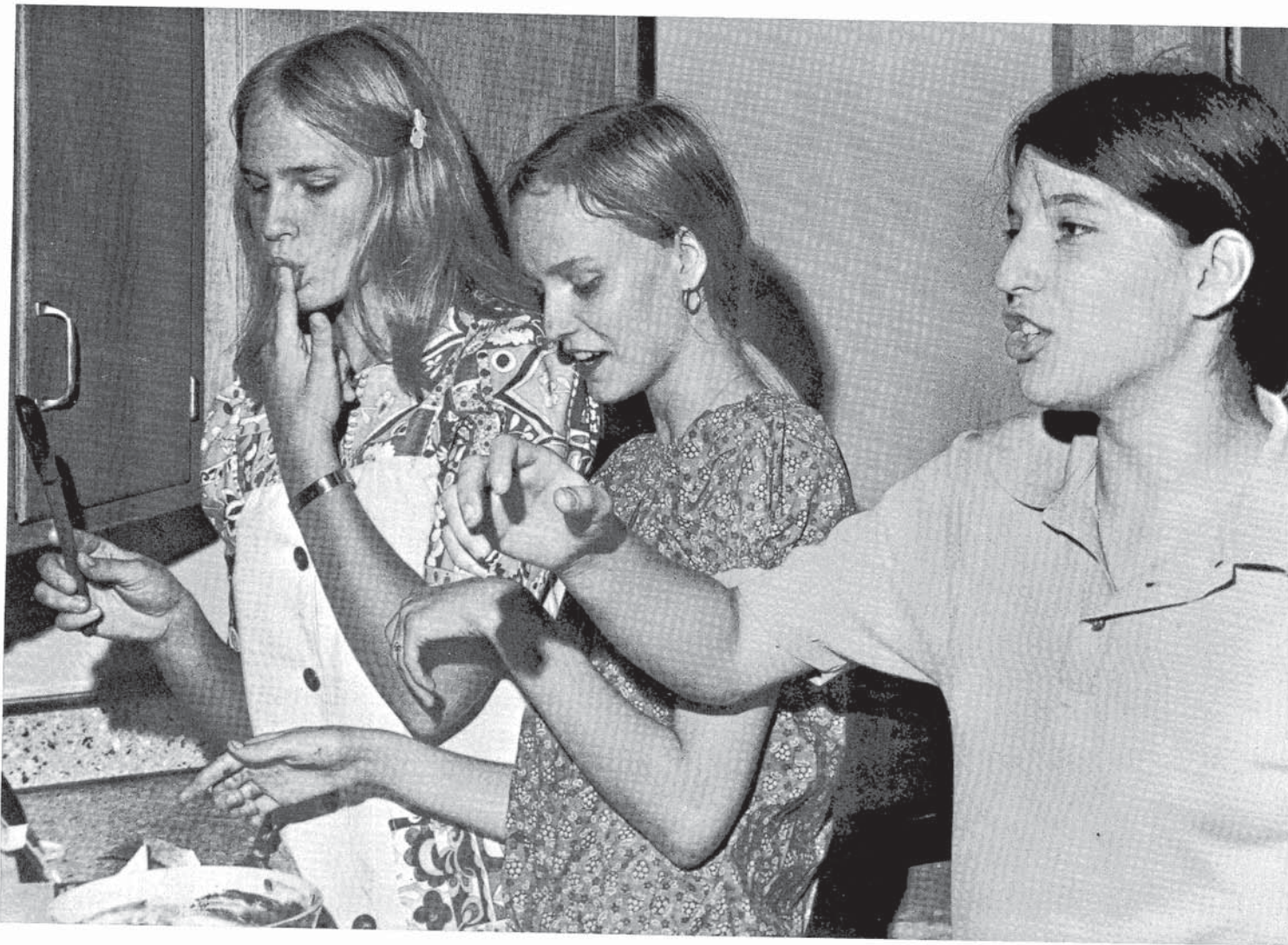

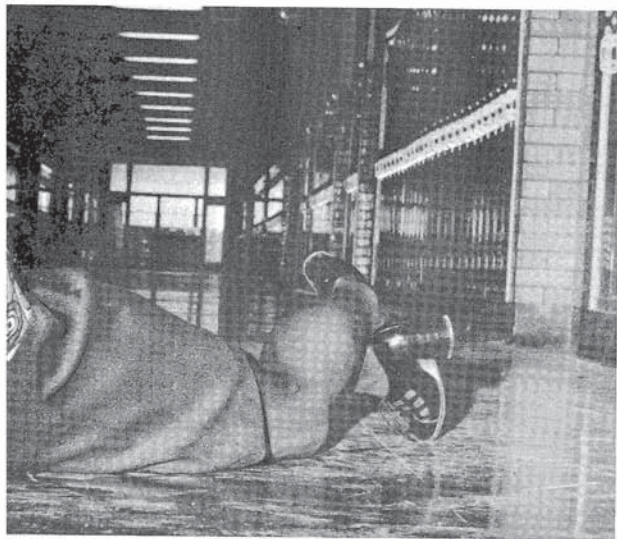
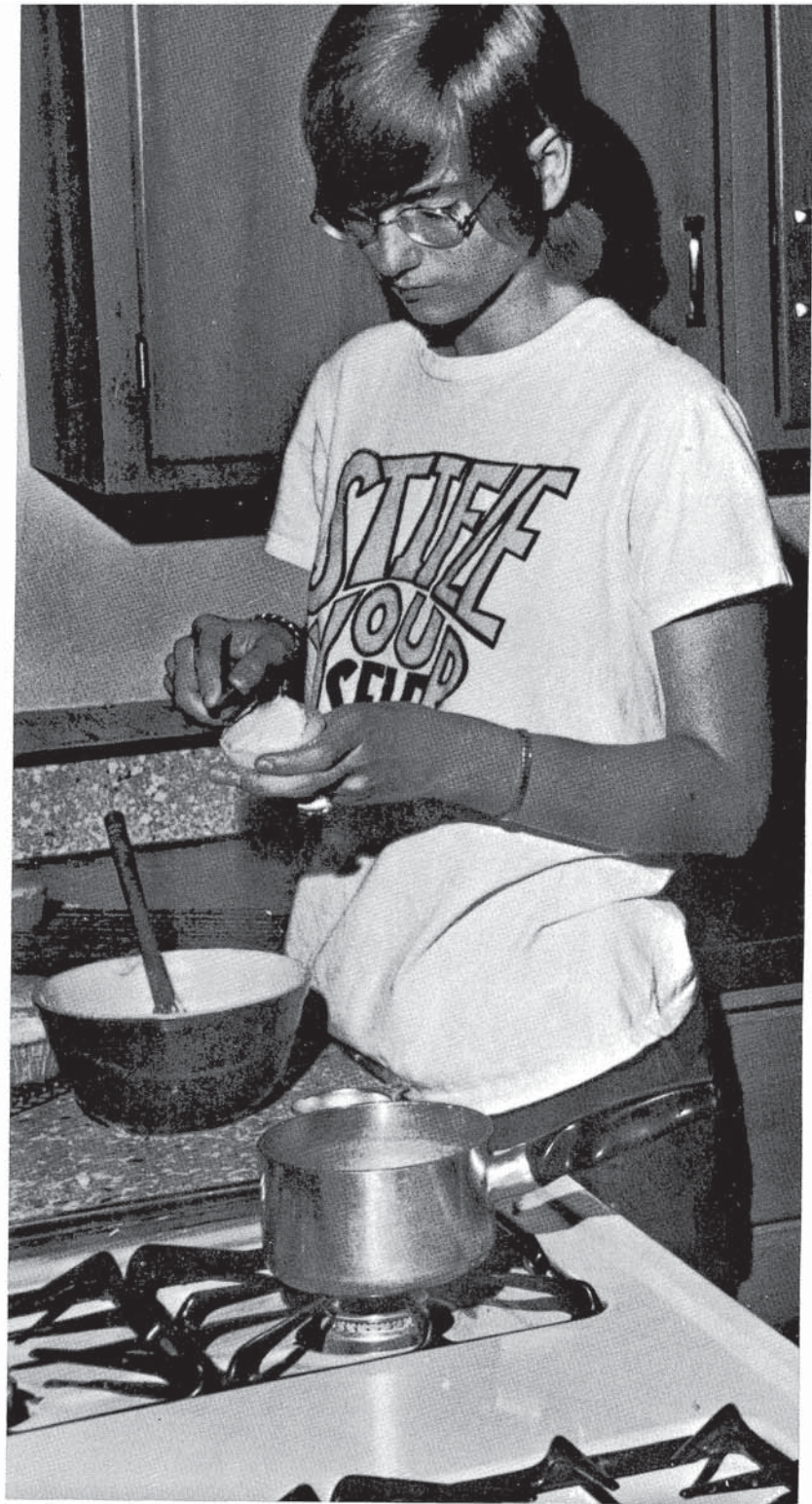
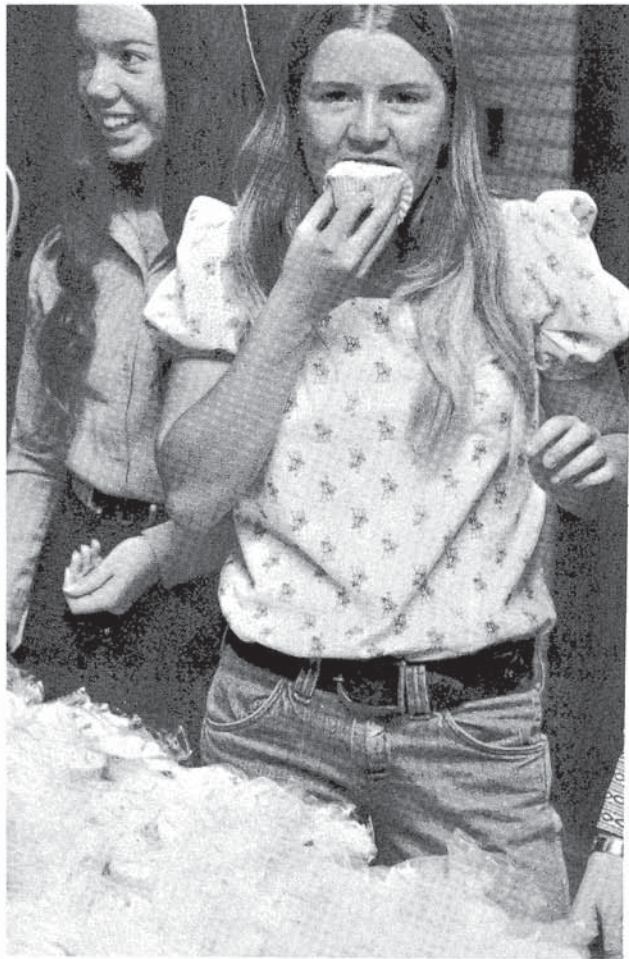

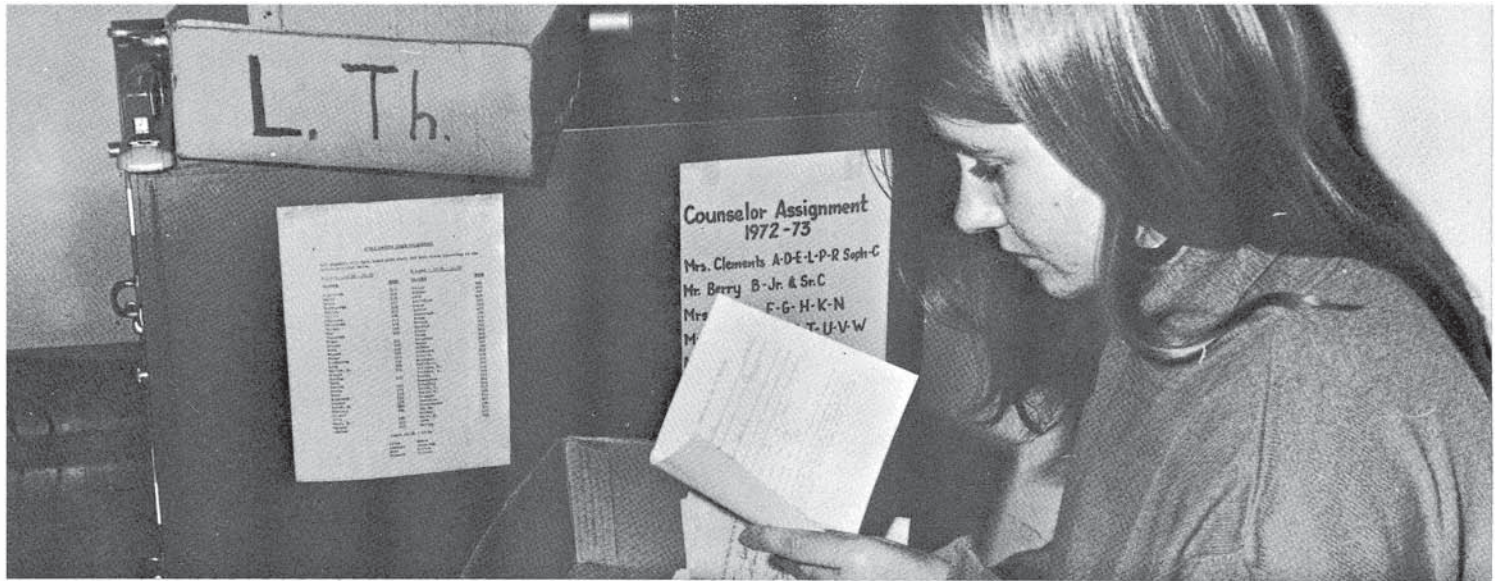

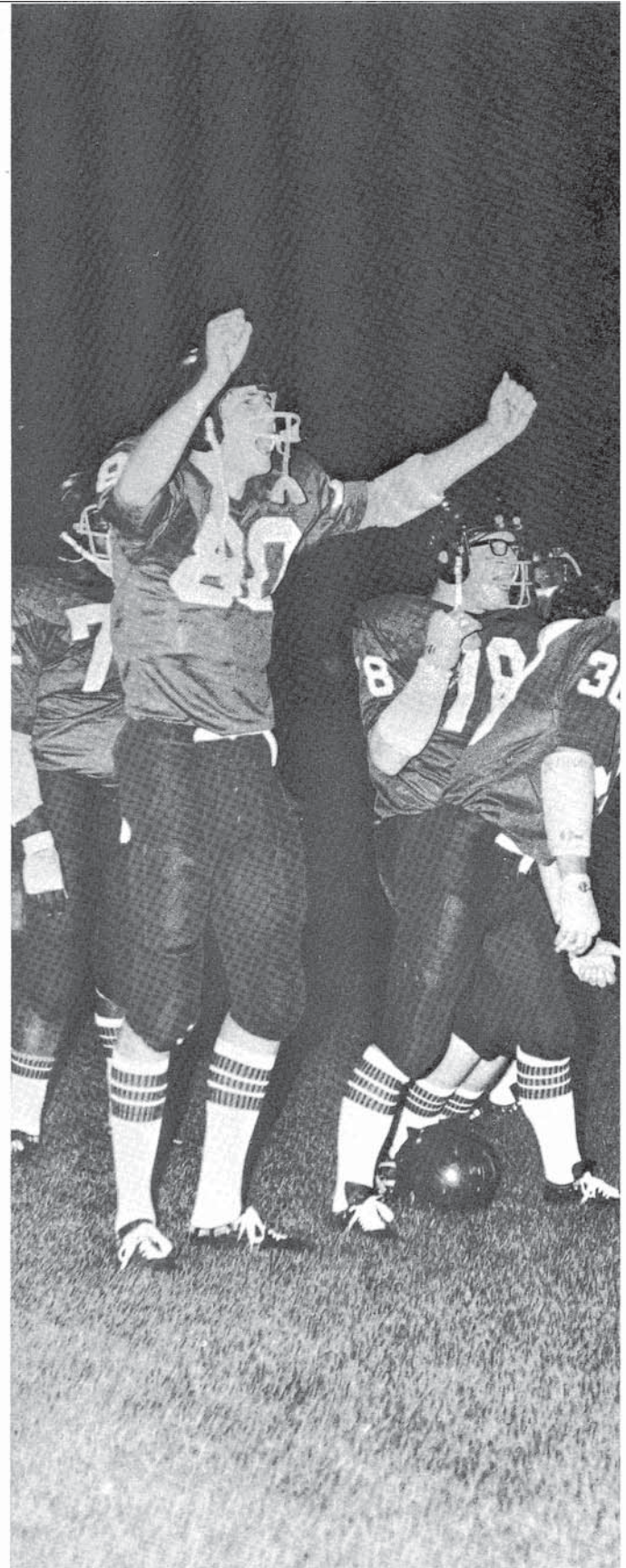
the call to their counselors.

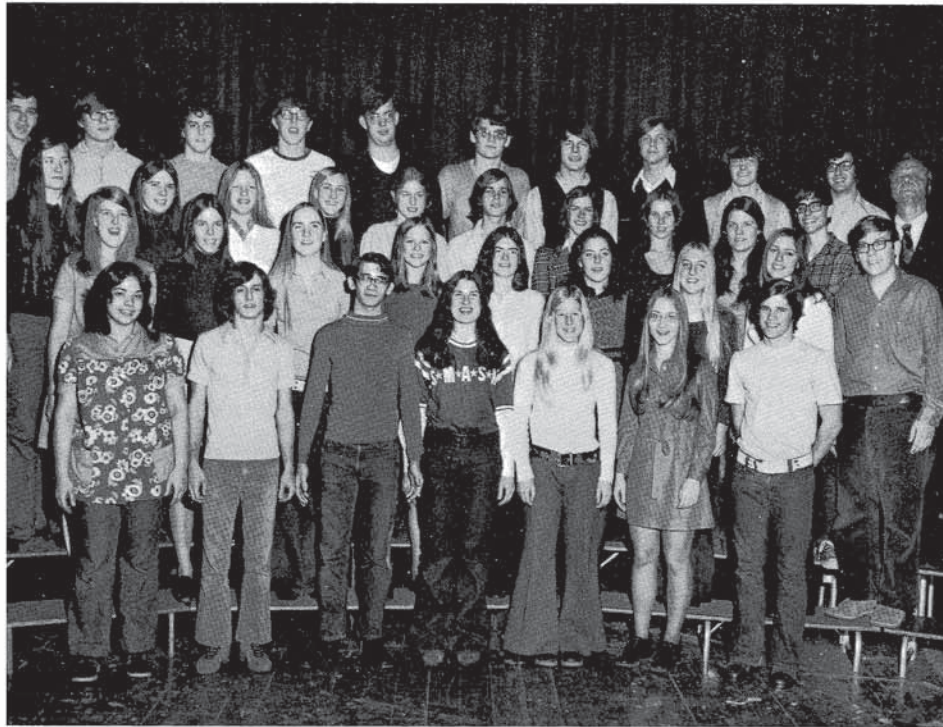

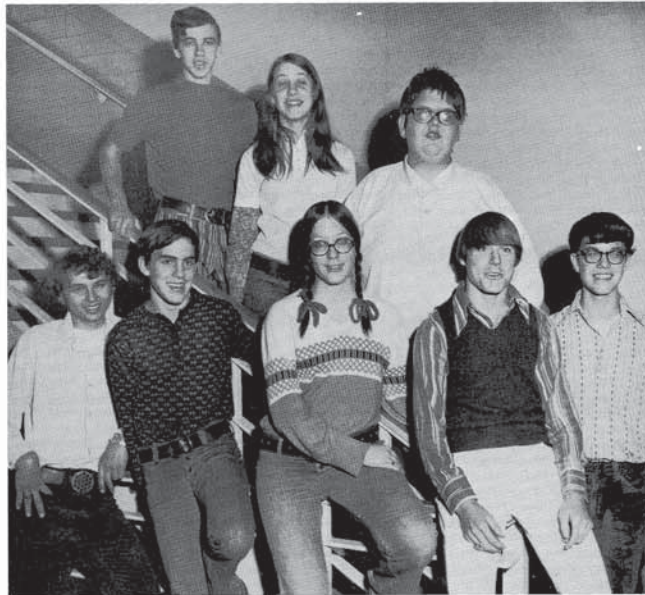
