

Teachers and Board of Education Lock Horns in Unit 4's First Work Stoppage

Sore throats, aching feet, and sleepless nights were by-products of the confrontation between 480 teachers and 7 board members in the weeklong strike. What issues could be important enough for teachers to risk losing their jobs? The main one was student discipline. Others were pay for extracurricular assignments, guaranteed preparation time, binding

arbitration, and specific evaluation procedures for teachers.

Students and parents were caught up in marches, rallies, telephone campaigns, and even door-to-door canvassing. The teachers accepted the Board's terms and returned to work under the threat of an injunction, wondering if they would ever gain more control over their working conditions.

Certainly the Board of Educ proved itself to be the patron of extramural girls' athletics.









As the year progressed, and more issues were decided upon by the Board of Education, Dr. Berner continued to act as intermediary between the board and teachers.


