Coach Gene Armer has a knack for producing crosscountry runners who exhibit what he calls "the four qualities for success: dedication, hard work, perseverance, and pride." The 1966 cross-country team of Urbana proved again that Mr. Armer's formula bears excellent results. The team was undefeated in eleven dual meets, bringing Coach Armer's 19season record to 147 wins and only 18 losses. They brought home Urbana's 11th Big 12 title and 10th district title in 19 years. They dominated downstate Illinois cross-country.

As the scores of the dual meets point out, this year's Tiger team faced little stiff competition. With such weak opponents, as Champaign and other area teams, Urbana's preparation for the bigger meets, which included Chicago area schools, was definitely handicapped. Nevertheless, the team had a magnificent season.

For the Urbana Tigers the 1966-67 basketball season was one of ups and downs, hot nights and cold nights, good breaks and bad breaks. Potentially, the team was as good as Urbana's best. They had depth, scoring ability, rebounding power, and speed. And actually, their 16—10 record was better than it appears, for 7 of their 10 losses were to state-rated teams.

Despite discouraging losses for a team which through junior high and high school had become accustomed to winning, several bright moments were registered. The team's 16 wins included a rare defeat of Decatur in their gym and a 3rd place finish at the Danville Tourney. Some of the best games played by any Urbana team were this year's devastations of Mattoon, Bloomington, Monticello, and Peoria East. Even some of the losses had encouraging aspects, as the Tigers nearly twice defeated Schlarman and achieved a half-time lead against powerful Springfield.

The scoring this year was extremely well balanced with the averages of captains, Larry Johnson and Jerry Lyman, and teammates, Bill Mock, Mark Beckrum, Ron Butler, and Jerry Wells, all within 5 points. Rebounding, led by Bill Mock and Larry Johnson, was the team's strong point. Shooting was their weak point. The latter category, however, was plagued more by inconsistency than by lack of ability. In fact, inconsistency was the team's affliction all season long. At times they were mediocre, and at times they were great. But when they were great, they were unbeatable.
