Charles M. Carpenter

A Tribute to Charles Carpenter

Charles Carpenter taught U.S. History and Economics at U.H.S. from 1952 until his death March 22, 1966. While at Urbana, he served as sponsor of the junior classes of 1954 and 1965, the senior classes of 1955 and 1963, and the Travel Clubs of 1954 and 1955.

As a major and later lieutenant colonel during World War II, he gained national fame as "Bazooka Charlie" for knocking out Nazi tanks and planes. Lt. Col. Carpenter piloted a reconnaissance Piper Cub which he mounted with six "bazooka rockets" that fired from a trigger in the cockpit.

After the War, Mr. Carpenter became Commander of Cadets at Roosevelt Academy and later joined the University of Illinois History Department where he taught for five years before coming to U.H.S.

It is perhaps impossible to do Mr. Carpenter justice and no words can really tell what kind of man he was. A war hero who never spoke of the war—a rugged athlete who also wrote poetry—a gentleman who spoke with tolerance and wisdom. This he was and more.
