Who's Who at St. Luke CME: Sister Tressa Easley

"St. Luke has always been known as a friendly church. I love my church." Sister Tressa Easley

Sister Tressa G. Easley has lived in the Champaign-Urbana area all of her life. She attended Willard and Lawhead Grade Schools and graduated from Champaign Jr. and Sr. High Schools.



Tressa G. Easley is presently active with the Missionary Society, but as a lifelong St. Luke member, she is a former member of the Kennedy Club and the Progressive Club. Growing up in Champaign has afforded her to see many changes over the years. When wanting to know anything about St. Luke C.M.E. Church, she has always been one of the people to go as a source of information. During one recent conversation with her, she recalled the fun she had during her childhood and teenage years. Some of her fondest memories were when the church went on hayrides and church picnics that were held with other churches (Baptists) in the community such as Mt. Olive, Freewill and Pilgrim. She stated that in those days the churches also exchanged pulpits.

When Sister Tressa was growing up in St. Luke, she participated in the Epworth League. What is known today in the Christian Methodist Episcopal (CME) Church as the Christian Youth Fellowship (CYF) was called the "Epworth League". In researching the Epworth League, I found that according to *Wikipedia, the Free Encyclopedia*, the Epworth League is a Methodist young adult association for individuals ages 18-35. It traces back to the founding of the organization by the United Methodist Church's predecessor denomination, the Methodist Episcopal Church, formed in 1889 at Cleveland, Ohio, by the combination of five young people's organizations then existing. At its conception, the purpose of the league was the promotion of intelligent and vital piety among the young people of the Church. This organization still exists in the United Methodist Church..

Sister Tressa reminisced that the Epworth League met every Sunday at 6:00 PM at the church. The activities primarily included reading Bible stories (Usually the stories were read to them.) and performing skits. The leaders were Mrs. Clara Jackson Mrs. Odelia Wesley.

She shared that St. Luke has always been considered a friendly church. Sis. Tressa and her husband for over 60 years, Syral (deceased), were married at St. Luke by Rev. Crowder. They raised their children in St. Luke. She said the church service was always good, but the third Sunday was when the Youth Choir sang. On that Sunday, there would be standing room only. The formation of the Youth Choir, under the direction of Willie T. Summerville, attracted youth from all over the twin cities. (Continued on page 2)

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What's Cooking With Min. Noah Brown?

With the arrival of spring, Min. Noah Brown is sharing his mouth watering Chicken Eggroll recipe.



Egg roll is a term used for many different foods around the world. In the United States it most commonly refers to a variety of spring

roll. In mainland China, many Chinese-speaking regions of Asia, and Chinese immigrant communities around the world, an egg roll, also known as a love letter, predominantly refers to the egg-based, flute-shaped pastry, with typically yellowish, flaky crust often eaten as a sweet snack or dessert commonly eaten by Asians.

Mín. Noah's Famous Chicken Eggrolls 1 bag dry coleslaw cabbage mix with carrots

1 large yellow onion chopped
1 whole chicken baked
Season salt
Pepper
Onion powder/ garlic powder
Butter or margarine

1. Sauté coleslaw mix in one stick of butter until softened. Add chopped onion, season to taste with season salt, pepper, and garlic powder. Pout into a bowl and set aside.



- 2. After baking the whole chicken, de-bone it and add to the coleslaw mix. Season with more pepper, garlic powder, and onion powder. (to liking)
- 3. Wrap in the egg roll wraps (1 ¹/₂ tablespoons). Follow directions on eggroll wrap package on how to wrap them.
- 4. Drop into heated vegetable oil and let fry until golden brown. Yields 20-25 wraps.

Optional: Shredded cheese, sautéed mushrooms or cooked chicken flavored rice may be added to the mixture.

KNOW YOUR HISTORY

Rose Marie McCoy

From Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia **Rose Marie McCoy** (born April 19, 1922, Oneida, Arkansas) was one of the most influential and prolific songwriters of the 1950s and 1960s.

McCoy moved to New York City in 1942, pursuing a singing ca-

reer. Her vocal talent got her bookings at many famous venues such as Harlem's Baby Grand, Detroit's Flame Show Bar, Cincinnati's Sportsmen's Club, and Toronto's Basin Street.

In 1952, Rose Marie McCoy wrote and recorded two songs for the newly formed Rhythm & Blues label Wheeler Records, "Cheating Blues" and "Georgie Boy Blues". After publishers heard these songs they began seeking her out. One of the first songs she was asked to write was a half-spoken, half-sung song, "Gabbin" Blues" sung by Big Maybelle with the talking part provided by Rose Marie McCoy. "Gabbin' Blues" turned out to be the first big hit for Big Maybelle and also the songwriter's first hit.

McCoy went on to write other songs for Big Maybelle, as well as other popular Rhythm 'n' Blues artists including, Louis Jordan ("If I Had Any Sense I'd Go Back Home" and "House Party") and co-wrote, with Fred Mendelsohn, Nappy Brown's 1955 single "Don't Be Angry".

Around this time Rose Marie McCoy teamed up with songwriter Charles Singleton, also known as Charlie Singleton. They soon scored their first hit, "It Hurts Me to My Heart", recorded by Faye Adams. Their collaboration lasted about eight years

and together they penned many hits for the top artists of the time, including Elvis Presley's "I Beg Of You", The Eagles' "Trying to Get to You" (later recorded in Presley's *Sun Sessions*), Ruth Brown's "Mambo Baby", and Nappy Brown's "Little by Little". Singleton & McCoy tunes were also recorded by Nat King Cole, Little Willie John, Eartha Kitt, Aretha Franklin, Eddy Arnold, The Five Willows, Big Joe Turner, The Du Droppers, Little Esther, The Clovers, and many other top artists of the time.

After the Singleton and McCoy team broke up, Rose Marie McCoy continued to write songs on her own and in collaboration with other writers. Her most successful song of the 1960s was "I Think It's Gonna Work Out Fine," which became Ike and Tina Turner's first top 20 pop single and their first Grammy nomination. Though she is most often associated with songs recorded by legendary Rhythm & Blues artists of the 1950s and 60s, Rose Marie McCoy has written many jazz, pop, rock 'n' roll, country, and gospel songs. Legendary jazz vocalist Jimmy Scott has recorded nine Rose Marie McCoy tunes. Sarah Vaughan has recorded six of her songs, five of them found on the singer's 1974 album *Send in the Clowns*.

Many other artists have recorded some of the over 800 songs she has had published, including but not limited to: Pearl Bailey, Maxine Brown, Shirley Caesar, Les Paul & Mary Ford, Patti Page, Debbie Reynolds, Lenny Welsh, Dinah Washington, Barbara Lewis, Del Shannon, Joe Medlin, Freddie Scott, Billy & Lillie, Tommy Sands, Marie Cole, Shirley and Lee, Sammy Turner, Solomon Burke, Toni Arden, The Crew-Cuts, Ellerine Harding, Annie Laurie, Al Hibbler, Vera Longus, Jimmy Rushing, Eartha Kitt, Otis Williams, Bette Midler, Billy Eckstine, Ella Mae Morse, Chuck Jackson, Eddy Arnold, Dizzy Gillespie, Brook Benton, Buddy Ace, Varetta Dillard, Ivory Joe Hunter, Big Dee Irwin, Jane Froman, Shirley Ellis, Jimmy Rushing, Peggy Lee, Jean Wells, Jo Stafford, Georgia Gibbs, Joe Erskine, Bobby Vee, Wilbert Harrison, Linda Hopkins, The Platters, The Four Preps, Dakota Staton, The Harptones, Moms Mabley, Etta James, Gloria Lynne, Faith Hill, Linda Ronstadt and James Taylor.
